PRINCETON, N. J., June 8.—The baseball team took its last practice this afternoon preparatory to the game here tomorrow with Yale. The players are all in fine condition. Meyer has recovered from his cold and will play at short stop. Chapman will occupy left field. Many old graduates have arrived in town and will be on hand to encourage the Princetons. Wilson of the '97 team arrived Wednesday, and will assist Bradley in coaching the team until after the Harvard game next Wednesday. It was learned to-day that the chances for a third game with Harvard, should Princeton win Wednesday's game, are very slight, as Harvard says she is unable to accept any date for the game.

The Yale team arrived in New York last night and will depart for Princeton this morning. Upward of 1,000 students huddled under umbrellas in front of Osborn Hall, at New Haven, early last evening before the departure of the team for its game with Princeton to-morrow. One of the biggest demonstrations of recent years had been planned, but was prevented by rain.
