BOYS LOOT CHURCHES.

Make Free with Wine and Their Condition Leads to Arrest.

Five boys, all about fourteen years old, were arraigned in the Gates Avenue Court, Brooklyn, yesterday on the specific charge of breaking into the First Baptist Trinity Church, on Hendrix Street, near Arlington Avenue, East New York, and stealing \$5. Four other churches have also been looted, all, it is thought, by the same gang of youthful desecrators. These churches are St. Clement's, Pennsylvania and Liberty Avenues; St. Michael's, Jerome Street and Liberty Avenue; East End Baptist Church, Van Sicklen and Glenmore Avenues, and Union Christ Church.

In addition to breaking open the money boxes the youngsters made free with wine they found in the edifices. This made them hilarious, and their condition as arm in arm they staggered through the streets on Monday, the day of the robberies, aroused the suspicion of detectives and led to their arrest.

At the station house the boys gave their names as William Pierson of 610 Liberty Avenue, William Farrington and Fred Farrington of 400 Linwood Street, Patrick Ireland of 45 Elton Street, and Thomas Lynch of 793 Glenmore Avenue. With the exception of Lynch, all admitted their guilt, and were held for Special Sessions.
