

# TIGERS DOWN OLD PENN.

## Large Crowd Sees Princeton Win Basket Ball Game, 31 to 20.

PRINCETON, N. J., Feb. 15.—Displaying unusual form, the Princeton University basket ball team defeated Pennsylvania here to-night before a large crowd of spectators by the score of 31 to 20. During the whole of the game Pennsylvania managed to shoot only three field goals to the Tigers' twelve. The remainder of the Pennsylvania team's points were made by goals shot from fouls by Saxe, who displayed great accuracy in this department. ## High School Athletic Plans.

The regular monthly meeting of the High School Games Committee was held yesterday afternoon at the Board of Education Building. The reports of several committees were read, but the football subject was not touched upon at all. One of the main points of contention at the meeting was the physical examination of the students of the public schools before they are allowed to compete in an athletic event. The present plan, it was contended by many, that of examining every student under the supervision of a physician, was gone into extensively, and the opinion of the benefits derived as against the disadvantage was argued at length by the supporters of the system. No definite conclusion was reached in the matter.

It was decided that the High Schools swimming championship be held at the College of the City of New York on March 4, and the relay championships will be a part of the games of the Thirteenth Regiment. The Baseball Committee decided that the championship of the city should be decided by the best two out of three games, and there will be a championship tournament between Brooklyn and Queens on the one side and Manhattan, Bronx, and Richmond on the other. A committee was also appointed to take up the arrangements of the outdoor championships and the novice games. Stuyvesant was again awarded the championship in the basket ball series with a clean record of victories. Newtown High School, which made its first appearance in the championships this season, was second to Stuyvesant.

## Bath Beach A. C. Stag.

The first entertainment of the newly formed Bath Beach Athletic Club was held at the Belmont Hotel, Bay Twenty-second Street and Bath Avenue, last night. The club intended to run a boxing show, but this was called off and a vaudeville show was substituted. The officers of the club are M. A. Bettman, President; W. G. Flay, Secretary, and Thomas Goldman, Treasurer. The club will hold boxing shows at its future entertainments.

## Yale Plays Dartmouth To-night.

A hockey match that promises considerable interest will be played to-night at St. Nicholas Rink, when the Yale seven lines up against Dartmouth. The game will be a fitting prelude to the Yale-Harvard match, which is scheduled for the latter part of the week. The Yale-Dartmouth game was originally scheduled for the Boston rink, but owing to the non-completion of the building was transferred to New York.

## Champion Swimmers in Races.

The features of the annual swimming races of the New York Athletic Club on Saturday night will be the American polo game, the first appearance of Harold Smyrk, amateur champion of England, and Champion Daniels will be on the mark with six other crack local swimmers in the 500-yard Metropolitan A. A. U. championship. The other events on the card, all open, are the 100-yard handicap, (limit 15 seconds.) 75 yards, and fancy diving handicap.

## Point System Plan Deferred.

At a meeting of the Student Board of Representative at Columbia University yesterday the matter of the adoption of a point system was brought up. The board seemed to be in favor of limiting the number of offices that an undergraduate could hold during a term, but it could come to no satisfactory agreement as to the value at which each office should be rated. Final action was postponed until the end of the week.
