

# PENNSYLVANIA WINS BASKET BALL TITLE

## Princeton Defeated in Playoff of Tie for Intercollegiate Championship.

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PHILADELPHIA, Penn., March 29.—The University of Pennsylvania captured the intercollegiate basket ball championship in Weightman Hall to night by defeating Princeton, 16 to 14. It was the first time since 1909 that the bunting went to Pennsylvania, and was directly due to four field goals by Louis Martin, a stripling of a lad not yet 19 years old.

Two thousand five hundred spectators jammed the hall, and as the two great teams, tied for the championship, clashed and the playing became snappy the din was almost deafening. Such a game as Pennsylvania played has not been seen in years. They were a whirlwind in the attack, and had Princeton baffled on the defense. Time and again the Tiger aggregation was forced to make long shots.

Martin, McNichol and Williamson for the Red and Blue, and Captain McTigue and Haas for the Princeton squad, furnished thrills every minute, but after the first half there was no doubt as to the outcome of the game. Haas threw several fouls in the first half.

In the last half Princeton, in a wild effort to check the tide of the game, rushed fresh men into the field. The score then stood 10 to 9, and by a series of rush plays that bewildered Penn for a time they increased the score to 16 to 14. Pennsylvania settled down then and neither side scored another point before the final whistle blew.
