

# PENN FIVE DOWNS TIGERS.

**Red and Blue's Steadiness Spells Victory by 18 to 13 Score.**

PRINCETON, N. J., Jan. 19.—The University of Pennsylvania basket ball five defeated Princeton here tonight, 18 to 13, in the most hotly contested game seen on the floor this season. Princeton led during the first part of the game and the final outcome was in doubt until the last few minutes of play, when Pennsylvania took a five-point lead. Pennsylvania's accuracy at caging goals and steady floor work was mainly responsible for its victory, while Princeton's shooting was of the lowest order.

The Princeton five started the game with a rush and opened the scoring in the first minute of play with a foul goal by Paulson. McNichol tied the score shortly afterward, but Haas's field goal gave Princeton the lead again. The Orange and Black five kept the margin on their side until the last minute of the first half, when scores by McNichol and Lavin gave Pennsylvania a two-point lead. The half ended with the score 9 to 7 in favor of Pennsylvania. Princeton started well in the second half, when Rahill's goal tied the score, but Pennsylvania opened up a brilliant attack and took the lead to win.
