NEW HAVEN, Conn., March 10.—Penn continued its unbroken record of basket ball victories by defeating Yale tonight, 44 to 16. From start to finish the Ells were outclassed and the Quakers scored practically three times as often, leading, 27 to 5, at intermission.

Captain Van Slyck of Yale, who began the game leading the league by four points as individual scorer, was passed by Sweeney, who registered twenty points to Van Slyck's ten during the contest.

Pennsylvania's smoothly operating team game reeled off scores with machine-like regularity. Yale scored only one field goal in the first half, when Hamill tossed a long basket one-third the length of the hall. Yale penetrated the visitors' defense more easily in the second half, tallying 11 points to 17 for Penn. Rosenast and Sweeney were in excellent scoring form, while the defensive work of Peck and McNichol checked the Eli attack.

This was Yale's first game of the league season.
