

QUAKERS STOP PENN STATE.

Larsen's Pitching Tames the Nittany Lions—Score, 4 to 2.

PHILADELPHIA, May 28.—Walter Larsen pitched the Quaker nine to a brilliant 4 to 2 victory over Coach Bezdek's powerful Penn State nine here on Franklin Field today, causing one of the biggest upsets of the season.

With a record of thirty-one straight victories to their credit, of which twenty have been made so far this season, the Nittany Lions came down here confident of mauling Captain Harvey's team for an easy victory, but with the masterful twirling of the big Salt Lake City lad, who is only a sophomore at the West Philadelphia Institution, and the timely hitting of the Quakers, a stop was finally put to the wonderful string of conquests strung up by the Center County collegians.
