

TIGERS WIN AT HOCKEY.

Princeton Defeats Pennsylvania on Ice by 4 to 0 Score.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 6.—Penn received a surprising jolt at the hands of the Princeton hockey team at the Ice Palace tonight, the Tigers winning 4 goals to 0. It was through the individual efforts of Van Gerbig, a New York lad, that the visitors were enabled to deliver the jolt. After defeating Yale recently the Red and Blue fully expected to take Princeton into camp also.

While Van Gerbig was the high-scoring ace, Captain Eugene Maxwell at goal was one of the outstanding stars of the match. Time after time the New Yorker who guards the goal for Princeton saved what looked like sure counters. Wanamaker, Pringle and Diall tried their hardest to get the puck past Maxwell, but were unsuccessful. In the first two periods Penn was handicapped by having Blank, a weak goal tender, in the game, and when Finney relieved him in the final period, the Tigers' scoring stopped.

Van Gerbig's goals were long and short. One went more than half the length of the rink, and whizzed by Blank at lightning speed. The match was very rough and Referee Devine had to part the players several times when it looked as though they might come to blows. More than 3,500 watched the match.
