

# COLUMBIA BEATEN BY QUAKER NINE

**Blue and White Unable to Bunch  
Hits Effectively and Penn  
Wins by 6 to 3.**

PHILADELPHIA, April 15. — Columbia's baseball team succumbed to the University of Pennsylvania's nine on Franklin Field this afternoon by a score of 6 to 3. Both teams pounded the ball savagely, no less than twenty-one safe blows rollicking to all corners of the field.

The Red and Blue led with eleven lusty wallops. The Morningside Heights combination squandered their hits when a safe blow would have chased a large number of runners across the pan. Twice the Blue and White team collected three bingles, but only garnered one run in each frame in both the fifth and the eighth innings. Three solid singles, together with a base on balls, gave the New Yorkers only one tally.

Coach Carish used three flingers against the Blue and White. Walt Huntzinger, the former Bellefonte Academy star, and best bet on Penn's 1920 nine, started the game, and was the only flinger of the afternoon who performed in a really praiseworthy manner.

For the four innings that Walt tolled nary a Columbia foot endangered the plate. Three hits were made off Huntzinger's offerings, but he always had perfect control when a hit would have meant a run. He disposed of three batters on strikes and did not issue a single pass to first base.

Price started on the mound for Columbia, but was an easy prey for the Penn sluggers, who knocked in four runs in the first two innings. Van Brocklin faced the Red and Blue for the remaining portion of the game, and was generally in difficulty. Some listless base running kept the Red and Blue ledger down so low, however.

Danny Sullivan maintained his hard hitting with three singles out of five trips to the plate, while Mike Whitehill and Captain Maher each connected twice. Stack led the Columbia batters with three safe clouts.
