

# COLUMBIA BEATS QUAKERS, 5 TO 4

## Blue and White Captures Commencement Day Game After an Uphill Fight.

There was quite a mixture of good and bad baseball at South Field yesterday afternoon when Columbia met and defeated the University of Pennsylvania nine in their annual Commencement Day clash by a score of 5 to 4. Errors and extra-base hits, hit batsmen and plenty of strikeouts, bases on balls and wild base running gave the season's record crowd nothing to complain of in the way of variety.

To Bliss Price, Coach Coakley's twirling ace, and Strom, the Blue and White's nimble left fielder, should go the major portion of the credit for the victory over the Philadelphia team, which held the New Yorkers pretty well in check until the eighth when a trio of runs wiped out a two-point advantage and gave the local outfit the game. Price, with the exception of the first inning, allowed Penn but two scattered hits and struck out five men. Strom seemed to be here, there and everywhere in left field, spearing long flies from all angles, and lined out a triple and single at bat.

The Quakers, by means of five hits and three errors, piled up their only scores of the afternoon, four runs, in the opening frame. Price nearly threw away his own ball game in this session, allowing not only the five safe blows, one of them a two-bagger, but committed two of the three errors himself. Goldblatt led off with a single to left and went to third when Whitehill, the next man up, bounced a hot liner off Price's glove. The Columbia twirler in his haste to catch Whitehill threw wild to first and the latter reached second in safety.

Sullivan scored both of his teammates with a Texas Leaguer to centre and then reached third himself on a poor toss by that gardener. Mouradian took advantage of the confusion and pounded out a two-base hit, sending Sullivan over the plate. But Price tightened up here, struck out Maher, forced McMallen to pop to Watt, and gave Mahaffery such a weak hit that Mouradian was able to progress only as far as third base. Price might have emerged without further damage had he not dodged a fake throw to second a moment later, allowing Mouradian to score and putting Mahaffery on third. Liebecott ended the inning by grounding to Moeschen.

The four-run handicap did not phase the Columbians a bit, however, and they set in to win back lost ground, scoring once in the fourth, again in the fifth and finally ending up with a three-run deluge in the eighth, two singles, a pair of hit batsmen and an error turning the trick.

Whitehill, the Red and Blue's first baseman, was hit in the face with a pitched ball in the fifth inning and had to be carried to the Penn dugout. After receiving first aid he resumed his place in the game. He was one of the four batsmen hit by pitchers during the course of the contest.
