COLLEGE BASEBALL ROUTED BY SHOWERS

Four Games Are Canceled Here, While Yale, Harvard and Princeton Are Kept Idle.

Rain caused the cancellation of practically all of the leading college baseball games in the East yesterday, four games in New York City being among those stopped by the weather. Columbia was scheduled to meet Syracuse at Baker Field, but wet grounds would not permit play, while the Columbia freshman-Poly Prep game was called off. The St. Francis nine, which was listed to play its alumni , also was stopped by the rain, as was the N. Y. U. and Williams clash.

Neither Harvard, Yale nor Princeton could get into action. The Crimson traveled to West Point to play Army only to have the gare called off, while the Elis were to have played host to Dartmouth in its new stadium, which seats 12,000. Lehigh reached Princeton, but found the grounds too wet to play on and the game was postponed until Monday.

Penn for the second time this week was prevented from opening its home season, rain stopping its fray with Swarthmore. Coach Hugh Duffy also was forced to take his Boston College squad away from Philadelphia without a game, the Drexel-Boston College game being called off.

Other games scheduled but not played were the Lafayette-Rutgers and Lehigh freshmen-Rutgers freshmen, Lawrenceville-Yale freshmen, Catholic University-Mount St. Mary's, Bucknell-Gettysburg and Villanova-Haverford clashes.

The Stevens Tech-Rensselaer Poly baseball game, which was to have been played at Stevens, was called off on account of rain. The Stevens-Montclair A. C. lacrosse game also was canceled.
