

YALE GAINED TOP BY BEATING PENN

**Ten-Inning Triumph of Eli Nine
Provided a Feature in Eastern
League Play.**

14 RECORDS SET IN GAME

**Marks Fell In Columbia's Over-
whelming Victory Over Cornell—
Lafayette Heads General List.**

Yale's victory over Pennsylvania at New Haven, which enabled the Elis to take the lead, and Columbia's record-breaking game against Cornell proved the highlights in last week's Eastern Intercollegiate Baseball League race.

In beating Pennsylvania, 4-3, in ten innings on Saturday, Yale gained revenge for an earlier 8-0 defeat at Philadelphia and dropped the Red and Blue from first place into a tie for second with Princeton, which defeated Cornell by 8-2 at Princeton on Saturday.

The Yale victory was the more impressive because it was gained without the aid of Johnny Broaca, sophomore mound star, who has been on the injured list with a sore arm. Ned Wheeler, veteran twirler, turned in a noteworthy performance and pitched the entire game, while John Paul Powhida, Penn pitcher, was removed from the box in the tenth inning. He was charged with the defeat, his first of the season.

Possess Batting Power.

While Columbia's 27-3 victory on Friday was turned in against Cornell, which has yet to win a game, it showed that the Lions possess tremendous batting power and must still be reckoned with in the race for the title. Fourteen records were broken and one tied in the one-sided contest.

This week will be one of the busiest of the season for the league with six games scheduled. Those expected to have considerable bearing on the outcome of the race are the Pennsylvania-Dartmouth game on Friday and the two contests between Yale and Dartmouth on Saturday.

Owen McDowell, Columbia first baseman, who collected five hits out of six times at bat in the Cornell game, is the batting leader of the league with nine hits out of seventeen times at bat for the fine average of .529. He is also tied for the most hits with his team-mate, Captain Johnny Balquist.

McNamara's Feat Noteworthy.

Outside the league, several noteworthy performances were recorded. Captain Bob McNamara of N. Y. U. shut out the formidable Holy Cross outfit with only two hits on Saturday, while Charley Devens, Harvard hurler, followed his two-hit shut-out of a week ago with another shut-out Saturday, allowing Penn State only four hits and striking out thirteen.

Lafayette shows the way in the general Eastern records with six straight successes, with Boston College in second place with five games won out of five starts. Nine teams were forced from the undefeated class in the past week.

Fordham is showing the way to the Metropolitan teams, holding the lead in the intracity series with two games won and no defeats. The Maroon also has the best general record with five games won out of six starts. Manhattan, which has failed to win a game in intracity competition, turned in a creditable performance in handing Villanova its first defeat of the season last Thursday.
