The Middies tallied five runs in the fourth on four singles registered against Pyrtex, who had just succeeded Litchfield on the mound, three passes by the same pitcher, and Salvia's sacrifice.

Jerry Bruckel went the 9-inning route for the Navy and was generally effective. He allowed eight hits, including a double and triple, but kept them well scattered. He struck out seven Indian batsmen and passed but two.
