# Fordham Downs Princeton, 18-1, Hearn Leading in 19-Hit Attack

## Ram Centerfielder Drives Two Singles, a Triple and Walks Twice—Rutgers Tops Lehigh, 8-4—Penn State, Navy Win

J., April 13.-Behind the slugging of Mike Hearn, Ram center-fielder and lead-off man, the Fordham baseball team scored in all but two innings to submerge the Princeton nine, 18-1, on University Field today. It was the second straight for the visitors and the third consecutive loss for the Tigers.

Hearn touched off a first-period three-run splurge for the New Yorkers when he drew a pass, advanced on Dick Purnell's error and came home on an infield out. He repeated with another walk for the Maroon's second-period tally and later drove in three runs and scored twice on two singles and a triple.

Three more triples and Fred Marcella's double were included in Fordham's nineteen hits. The Rams shelled two Tiger pitchers from the mound. Pete Murphy retired with two hits against him at the end of the second, and Fred Rowe was pounded for thirteen safeties in carrying through to the eighth, when Bill Fallon moved over from · Special to THE NEW YORK TIMES.
