PRINCETON ANNEXES LEAGUE TWIN BILL

Tigers Capture Opener From Columbia by 8-6 and Then Triumph in Tenth by 2-1

VICTORS ADVANCE IN RACE

Move From Sixth to Fourth in Standing—Carmichael Tops Dowd in Nightcap Duel

Princeton moved up to fourth place in the Eastern Intercollegiate Baseball League yesterday, achieving the two-notch advance by turning back Columbia in both ends of a double-header at Baker Field. After winning the opener, 8-6, in regulation time the Tigers annexed the nightcap in ten innings, 2-1.

The second game was by far the better of the two as the rival moundsmen, Sophomore Dan Carmichael for Princeton and Hector Dowd for Columbia, went the route. This encounter, listed for seven innings, was televised by the National Broadcasting Company, the first regularly scheduled sporting event to be pictured over the air waves.

Hits Single Over Second

Carmichael himself opened the decisive rally, starting the tenth with a solid single over second. Bill Moore, who had a great day at bat, getting seven hits, sacrificed, and when John Gefaell fouled to Bill Stickel at first the outlook was much brighter.

But Mark Hill outraced an infield roller to short and there were runners on first and third. Hill stole second as Stanley Pearson, who holds the intercollegiate squash racquets crown, was at bat. The latter then dropped an easy roller toward second, but the ball rolled so slowly that Carmichael crossed the plate and Pearson reached first before the ball could be fielded.

To win this one Princeton came from behind. Ken Pill blasted a homer over the right-field fence in the fifth, but the Tigers evened the count in the next frame on Moore's single, an outfield error by Bob Stoltz, Gefaell's sacrifice and Dowd's wild pitch. The deadlock endured until the third extra inning.

Tigers Clinch Verdict

In the opening engagement Princeton got off to a three-run lead, but Columbia forged ahead with a four-run rally in the third, only to see the Tigers even the score in the fourth. The Lions got an unearned tally in the fifth, but once again Princeton came from behind and clinched the verdict with a four-run outburst in the sixth.

George Smith and Berndt Lindgren shared the pitching for the Lions, yielding a total of ten hits. Lefty Dawson Farber, the Princeton hurler, went all the way for the victors, giving up eight safeties, which included a double and triple by Stickel.
