Johns Hopkins Defeats Princeton by 10-6 for Fifth in Row—Maryland Swamps the Navy, 12-3—Yale Tops Springfield

Loyola University of Baltimore ran up an 11-0 half-time lead on the City College lacrosse team at the Lewisohn Stadium yesterday and then went on to win by 15-3.

The Baltimore players proved too skillful in their stick handling and too fast afoot for the local ten. City College stiffened its defense in the second half and started scoring, but the Loyola lead was too big to overcome.

Bob McElroy, playing second attack, led the Loyola offensive with five goals. Dick Keller scored thrice. Ed McCarty tallied twice for the Lavender.
