PENN STATE SQUAD WINS MAT HONORS

Upsets Penn's Wrestlers in Eastern Meet—Defending Champions All Triumph

STATE COLLEGE, Pa., March 14—Penn State captured the team title tonight at the thirty-eighth annual championships of the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association in a surprising upset victory over highly favored Pennsylvania.

The Nittany Lions, with three individual champions, amassed 30 points. Pennsylvania was second with 23 and Navy third with 17.

Lehigh and Princeton, last year's co-champion with Yale, followed with 10 points each. Cornell posted 7, Army 3, Columbia 2 and Syracuse 1.

It was the ninth team victory for Penn State since Coach Charlie Speidel's grapplers joined the association. The Lions last won the crown in 1937.

In addition to the three title winners, State gained two second places and a third. The remaining points were gained through fall victories.

All four defending champions retained their titles, with Navy sharing individual honors with Penn State by gaining three championships. Penn and Princeton listed one each.

Charlie Ridenour, Penn State's 121 - pounder; Warren Taylor, Princeton's 136-pounder; Captain Mickey Bennett of Navy, 155, and Dick Di Battista, Penn, 175, were the successful 1941 leaders.

Sam Harry, Penn State sophomore, captured the 128-pound crown; Captain Glen Alexander of Penn State took the 145-pound title, Bill Carmichael, Oklahomabred Navy star, won the 165-pound

diadem, and Shuford Swift of Navy became the heavyweight champion. Di Battista's victory was his seventy-fourth in a row.

Harry's triumph was perhaps the most impressive of the tournament. The Lions' unbeaten sophomore upset the favorite, undefeated Jim Laggan, Penn captain, Harry manipulated a close bout. seconds before take-down bout's end to clinch a 9-5 decision.

Penn, the pre-tourney favorite, saw four of its five finalists defeated. Most costly defeat for the Quakers came in the heavyweight division when Swift, using his fine physical condition to advantage, came from behind to score a takedown to beat Penn's Bill Medcraft.
