CORNELL CONQUERS PENN, 5-3 AND 8-2

Double Setback Drops Losers Into 4th Place in Loop and **Gives Princeton Title**

ITHACA, N. Y., June 16—Cellardwelling Cornell upset Pennsylvania in both games of their two Eastern Intercollegiate Baseball League twin bill today. The setbacks, 5-3, and 8-4, dropped the Quakers from second to fourth place, and assured Princeton of the league championship.

Al Rothermel of Cornell and John Woebse each gave seven hits in the opener. But Cornell bunched three blows with two walks and two errors to score three runs in the sixth and break a 2-2 tie. Burke drove in two of the runs with a double.

Battles Allows Five Hits

Ken Battles, a southpaw, held Pennsylvania to five hits in the nightcap, while the Ithacans opened up on Ed Bechtel in the first inning. Burke hit a two-run homer and Charles Chapin, John Skawski and Jim Troutner contributed singles as Cornell scored four runs. Skawski's hit drove in two runs and in the third he hit a double to bring in another tally. Pennsylvania needed one victory

to top Princeton, and both teams played carefully throughout the first game. Cornell scored in the first inning on Capt. Joe Mascola's double, Strong's sacrifice and Chapin's outfield fly. Pennsylvania tied it up in the fourth on singles by Joe Blood and Larry Barnhorst. Cornell went back into the lead

in the same frame as Strong singled and was sacrificed to second by Chapin. He reached third on John Hagood's infield out, and scored on Skawski's single. Again Pennsylvania tied the score. This time in the fifth when Richard Mc-

Cunney singled, went to second on

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Rothermel's overthrow of that base on a fielder's choice. Two passes to Henry Lequeer and Blood forced McCunney across the plate.

Pennsylvania rallied in seventh and last inning after Cornell's three runs in that frame, Lequeer scoring after a three-base error by Skawski and Blood's single. Rothermel then shut off the spurt.

Cornell collected nine hits in the second game, bunching two of them for two runs in the third and getting two more tallies in the sixth on one hit, two walks, a wild pitch and one error.
