

# Penn Trips Harvard Quintet; Temple's Second-Half Rally Upsets Manhattan

## QUAKERS DEFEAT CRIMSON, 76 TO 59

Penn's Beck Sets Pace With  
30 Points in League Game  
With Harvard Quintet

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 28 — Ernie Beck, Pennsylvania's All-American center, scored 30 points to spark the Quakers to a 76-59 victory over a surprisingly tough Harvard team in an Eastern Intercollegiate contest at the Palestra tonight. The victory kept Penn in the running for the title.

Beck, who was held to a single field goal in the first quarter, finally found the target in the second quarter and then clicked in All-American fashion in the second half. He wound up with nine field goals and sank twelve fouls for a perfect night at a charity line.

Bill Dennis, one of four metropolitan New York players in the Crimson starting line-up, led Harvard with 24 points. The junior from Andrew Jackson High School, Queens, made ten field goals, mostly on set shots, and added four fouls.

Pennsylvania, which found Harvard's zone defense difficult to penetrate, bottled almost point-for-point with the Cambridge squad until midway in the third period. Tom Holt, Penn co-captain, broke a 41-41 tie with a foul and the Quakers finally got rolling offensively to rack up their nineteenth straight home court victory.

### Hoagland Sinks Foul

Karl Hoagland added a foul goal for Penn before Dennis came through with a one-pointer for Harvard. Hoagland scored on a long set shot, Heylman tallied a foul and Beck contributed two consecutive foul goals to get the Red and Blue attack rolling to victory.

There were moments when the crowd of 2,936 thought they would witness one of the season's major upsets. The score was tied four times in the first quarter before Penn stretched the period with a 17-16 advantage.

Penn moved to a 28-24 lead midway in the second period but held a slim 32-31 lead at half-time. Dick Lionette, Harvard center who was assigned to guard Beck, left the contest early in the second period after committing his fourth personal. He returned briefly in the last half.

With Dennis scoring seven consecutive points in the third quarter, Harvard remained in contention. The game was tied at 39 and 41 before Holt scored the foul goal which put Penn ahead for good.

In the second game of the twin-hill Villanova coasted to a 62-57 triumph over LeMoine.
