Yale's Rally Falls Short in Princeton Game—Field Soggy After Rain

NEW HAVEN, Conn.; May 11—Yale and Princeton played a ten-inning, 4-4 tie in an Ivy League baseball game at Yale Field today.

The umpires called the contest after rain that fell throughout the game made the field too slippery.

Yale missed an easy chance to win in the last of the ninth. The Elis loaded the bases with none out on singles by Dusty Clay and Tom Molumphy and a walk to Ray Carlsen. Princeton's pitcher, Herm Belz, then walked Colin Gracey to tie the score. But a fine throw from the center-fielder, John Wert, completed a double play on a fly ball and Belz got the next batter on a pop-up.

The tie will not be played off if Yale wins both its remaining league games, against Dartmouth and Harvard next week. This would clinch the third straight league crown for Yale.

If a play-off becomes necessary, the Yale-Princeton game at Princeton in two weeks will be counted as a league game,

Yale took an early lead on a walk and two singles in the first inning. But Belz drove in two runs for the Tigers with a double in the second. Wert's single scored him. The Tigers picked up an unearned run in the fourth, but were blanked the rest of the way by Bill Gillespie and Bruce Irving.

The Elis got two in the seventh on two hits, two walks and a sacrifice fly.
