

ASTON GETS GOAL IN LAST 3 SECONDS

Tigers Lose Despite 30-Point 2d-Half Surge by Bradley —Neuman Paces Penn

ITHACA, N. Y., Jan. 16—Blaine Aston's 15-foot jump shot with three seconds left in the game gave Cornell a 70-to-69 upset victory over Princeton tonight.

Leading by as much as 17 points, Cornell's lead was dissipated by a 30-point second-half splurge by Bill Bradley, Princeton's all-American. Bradley, under pressure all over the court by Dave Bliss of Cornell, a 5-foot-10-inch guard, hit on only two of 17 shots in the first half. He improved as the game wore on though, scoring the Tigers' last 8 points.

At 16:22 Bradley's jump shot tied the score at 65-all. The lead see-sawed and with Princeton ahead, 69—68, Cornell took over the ball with 33 seconds left.

With 10 seconds left Cornell called time and then with three seconds to go Aston scored.

A record Barton Hall crowd of 9,000 was present, while another 3,000 fans were turned away.

Jeff Neuman led Pennsylvania to a late second-half rally that carried the Quakers to a 73-62 victory over Columbia last night at University Gymnasium.

Neuman scored 19 points in the second period to finish as the game's high scorer with 29 points.

Pennsylvania, trailing by 4 points at half-time, abandoned the man-to-man defense it had been using for the first half and opened the second period in a 3—2 zone. The effect was immediate as the Quakers scored 6 quick points that gave them the lead for the first time since the opening minutes of the game.

But Columbia managed to match them basket for basket. Neuman took command with 2:12 to play, completing a 3-point play, that put Penn on top to stay. In all, Neuman tallied 7 of Penn's final 11 points, and assisted on one other basket by Stan Pawlak.
