

REBOUNTING SKILL WINS FOR QUAKERS

Penn Takes Command After Newmark of Lions Fouls Out With 5:30 to Play

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 18—Outmuscling the Lions under the boards, Pennsylvania dropped Columbia from the Ivy League lead tonight with a 67-58 victory at the Palestra.

Princeton, which had been in a three-way tie for the lead with Penn and Columbia, lost to Cornell, giving the Quakers sole possession of first place. Columbia, Cornell and Princeton are tied for second place.

Penn, with three players 6 feet 8 inches or taller, pulled away after Dave Newmark, the Lions' 7-foot center, fouled out with 5 minutes 30 seconds remaining.

Newmark, the game's leading scorer with 20 points, left the game with the score 48-48.

Twenty-two times the lead changed hands and on 13 occasions the score was tied. The game ended with most of the 7,500 spectators chanting:

"It's all over, it's all over, it's all over. . . ."

Two of the Quakers' big boys—John Hellings at 6-8 and Tom Mallison at 6-10—fouled out, but Newmark's absence hurt the Lions more.

Burgess Gets 11 Rebounds

The Quakers outrebounded the Lions, 42-31. Frank Burgess, a 6-9 center who picked up three early fouls against Newmark, was the most effective rebounder with 11. Newmark picked off nine.

Pennsylvania took the lead for good when Charles Fitzgerald hit two free throws with 4:01 to go. Thereupon the Quakers slowed the play, hit eight straight free throws and gradually lengthened their lead.

The Quakers' zone defense slowed down a Columbia offense that had been averaging more than 80 points a game.

Stan Pawlak of Penn went into the game as the Ivy League's leading scorer with a 23.3-point average, and was nearly blanked by Stan Felsing in the first half.

Pawlak missed 10 of 11 shots during that period, then hit five of seven in the second half to finish with 13 points. Felsing, the league's fifth-ranked scorer, finished with 18.

Columbia had just battled back from an 8-point deficit in the second half to tie the score when Newmark fouled out. He was called for pushing Mallison under the Columbia basket. Mallison followed him to the bench a minute later.

In the opening half, neither team led by more than 3 points. A layup by Newmark with five seconds to play gave Columbia a 26-25 edge at intermission.

A 6-minute-41-second scoreless lapse from the field by the Lions midway in the second half enabled Penn to shoot ahead, 42-34.

Newmark and Felsing then led a rally that pulled the Lions even at 42-all. The score stayed close until Newmark fouled out, then the Lions started slipping.

The Lions outshot the Quakers from the field, 40 per cent to 36 per cent. But the Quakers got 13 more shots and made three more field goals.
