Havrilak's 3 Touchdowns Pace Bisons' Offense

Philadelphia, Oct. 21 — Sam Havrilak, the Bucknell quarterback, led a fourth-period charge that upset the University of Pennsylvania, 28-27, today.

The 185-pound junior scored the tying touchdown with only 15 seconds left to play and Doug Marinak place-kicked the decisive extra point.

With his team trailing, 21-7, at half-time, Havrilak guided the Bisons to three touchdowns in the second half. He scored two himself on runs of 2 and 1 yards. He also passed for a 2-point conversion. Bruce Smith scored the other touchdown from the 2, capping an 11-play, 69-yard drive. Havrilak hit his fullback, Charles Bair, four times during the march on passes of 17, 19, 3 and 4 yards.

He completed 13 of 21 aeri-als for 135 yards, gained 94 yards on 16 carries, and punted five times for an average of 4.4 yards.

Neither team was able to score in the opening period. The Red and Blue, establishing its running game (they work from an I formation) drove to Bison 1-yard line but Bucknell held.

Penn drew first blood early in the second period, when Cabot Knowlton, a tailback, burst over from the 1, the first of his three tallies. On the 9-play drive Knowlton carried six times. The last three were through right tackle.

Eight plays later the Bisons scored on Havrilak's first touchdown, and went ahead, 7-6. On the ensuing kickoff Dave Barudin, the Penn second-string quarterback, took the ball up the middle for 69 yards, setting up the Quaker's second score again by Knowlton, from 10 yards out.

Bill Creeden, Penn's fine roll out quarterback, had an exceptional day, completing nine of 15 for 168 yards. As the second period was drawing to a close he hit Pete Wisniewski on a 60-yarder for a touch-down.

Creeden, a 190-pounder from Levittown, Pa., set a university career offense record, piling up 240 yards. His career total is now 3,157, surpassing the previous standard of 3,108 that had stood since 1950.

Fumbles were costly for the Quakers. They bobbled nine times, lost the ball on four of them, one set up the Bison's second score in the third period.

This was the Blue and Red's second defeat against two victories. The Quakers are 1-1 in Ivy League competition. Bucknell is 3-3. A gathering of 12,647 fans saw the game at Franklin field.
