Zbrzezni Sparks Offensive in Ending Bison Streak

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 28—Penn opened its 92d football season today with one of its finest productions by rebounding from an early 3-0 deficit for an exciting and well-contrived 27-10 victory over Bucknell on Franklin Field.

For two years, Sam Havrilak had been a thorn in Penn's side as he maneuvered Bucknell to 28-21 and 28-27 triumphs. But the Penn team today finally took some of the potency away from the Bison's triple-threat quarterback.

A crowd of 12,303 saw Bernie Zbrzezni, a junior, direct the Quaker team skillfully at quarterback. They also watched Jerry Santini go over for two touchdowns. He carried the ball 33 times for 148 yards before leaving late in the game with a charliehorse.

Other scoring was provided by a soccer-style kicker, Eliot Berry, who booted two field goals and three extra points and by Peter Blumenthal, who teamed up with Zbrzezni on an 85-yard touchdown play.

This highlight came in the fourth quarter after the Penn captain, Tom Hamlin, had recovered a teammate's fumble on their own 15-yard line. Zbrzezni passed down the center to Blumenthal, a junior from Valley Stream, L. I., who caught it on his 40. He outran two men then eluded the safety and scored. It was the second longest touchdown pass-play in Penn's history.
