# HARVARD TOPS PENN;

## HARVARD REMAINS UNDEFEATED, 28-6

Hands Penn First Setback
With Strong Early Attack
—6th in Row for Victor

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 2—Pennsylvania's bubble burst today as Harvard, on the pinpoint precision of both its defensive and offensive elevens, defeated the Red and Blue, 28-6, at Harvard Stadium and remained undefeated after six games.

Both teams had come into this game unbeaten, untied and "unbelievable," as one Crimson coach remarked, for neither had been given a chance for the Ivy League crown.

The outcome was decided early, with Harvard turning two interceptions and a recovered fumble into 14 points before the first quarter was half over. And when Vic Gatto, the Crimson's captain, ran a Pennsylvania punt back for 70 yards and a touchdown shortly after that, it looked like a rout of monumental proportions.

#### Hornblower Races Over

But despite a vastly superior running attack, Harvard scored only once more, at the beginning of the second quarter, when its quarterback, George Lalich, culminated a 73-yard drive with a 1-yard touchdown plunge, for a 28-0 lead.

Pat Conway, the Harvard safety man, was the player most responsible for Penn's misfortunes. He picked off Bernie Zbrzeznj's first pass on the Red and Blue 23-yard line. After one play, Ray Hornblower, Harvard's leading runner, ran 25 yards to score.

Conway made his second interception with a beautiful diving catch on his own 29. The Crimson didn't score directly from this break, but they kept Penn bottled up in its own territory. where the Quakers remained for most of the afternoon. Thus, when Gerry Santini,

the workhorse runner for Coach Bob Odell's eleven as usual, fumbled on his 21, another de-

fensive star, John Cramer, lineman, recovered for Harvard. Five plays later, Lalich went over from the 2 for the second touchdown. Zbrzeznj was not able to

complete a pass in the first

quarter, so blanketed were his receivers by Harvard's defenders. The Penn quarterback was also chased, mobbed and mauled a number of times while running futilely about looking for an open man. The Crimson kept up this type of pressure throughout the game. The Red and Blue could not move past Harvard's 26-yard line, except on one occasion

when Joe Armao recovered a fumbled punt reception (by Conway) in the fourth period. However, Harvard was determined not to let Penn score at all and stiffened mightily on the goal line. Kenn Dunn finally made it into the Crimson end zone after taking a pitchout from Zbrzeznj and galloping around right end

from the 1. Harvard did prove a point, though, when Cramer and Neill Hurley swooped in to block Eliot Berry's kick for the extra point. It was the added insult. Berry made the only other scoring threat for Penn when, at the end of the first half, he tried a 50-yard field goal. But Berry, who has made eight of

11 field-goal attempts this year with his soccer-style booting,

didn't come close this time, the ball falling short by 13 yards. Bob Monahan, a punt return specialist, was Penn's brightest hope, and he ran two Harvard kicks back 39 and 37 yards, breaking away both times. However, Harvard found the best answer to Monahan was to punt hardly at all. Gary Singleterry, however, did boot

a couple that went dead inside the 10, further complicating Penn's plans. All the Harvard backs shone. Gus Crim, the unsung fullback, looked especially strong when Lalich gave him the ball six times during the final touchdown march in the second period. He drove mostly up the
