

Princeton Opens Its New Gym By Defeating Penn Five, 74-62

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PRINCETON, N. J., Jan. 25—Princeton's basketball team defeated Pennsylvania today, 74-62, as a crowd of 5,500 turned out for the first intercollegiate event in Princeton's new field-house, named in memory of L. Stockwell Jadwin of the class of 1928.

Princeton's fans set up a chant of "Defense, defense" before the game, and it was defense that ultimately sealed the victory.

The Tigers, with Chris Thomforde, John Hummer and Jeff Petrie leading the battle off the boards, pulled down 38 rebounds to Penn's 23.

Thomforde, the 6-foot 9-inch center, also tallied 20 points as the Tigers scored their fourth Ivy League victory in four starts and ninth in 15 games over all. The Quakers' won lost record is 2-2 in the league and 7-5 over all.

Princeton got a 19 point performance from the slack-mov-

ing Petrie. Hummer had 16 and Bill Sickler, a sophomore guard from Wantagh, L.I., scored 13.

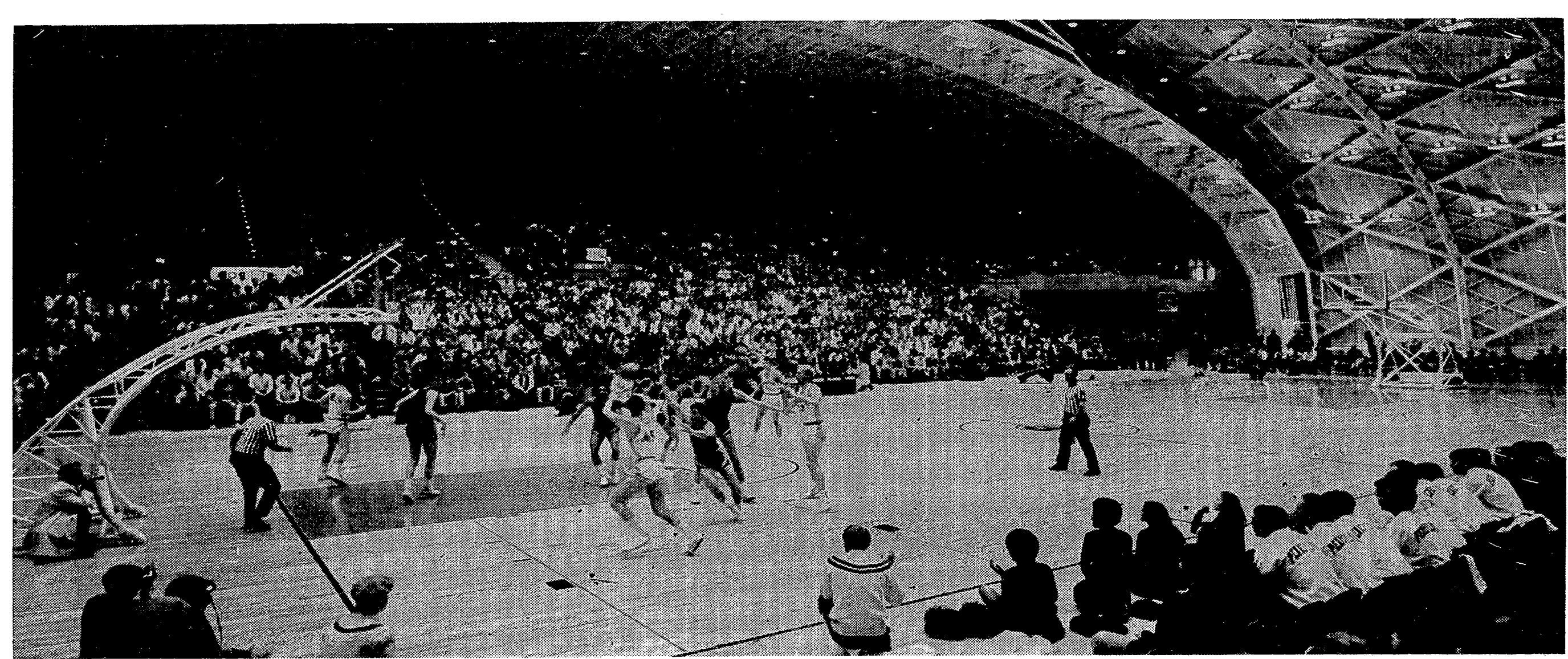
Princeton soared to an 11-point edge midway through the opening half and had a 36-29 lead by half-time. Rebounding, in which the Tigers took 21 to Penn's 10, was responsible for that advantage.

After the intermission, Penn suffered a severe shooting drought, and it was a little over five minutes before Steve Bilsky. A guard, sank Penn's first field goal.

But Bilsky, scoring on drives and short jump shots, Dave Wohl and Jim Wolf, sparked a comeback and the Quakers narrowed the deficit to 3 points three times. In the final five minutes, however, the anxious Quakers were guilty of missed passes and loose ball handling.

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vantage of the errors and out-shot Penn, 9 to 3, in the final minute and a half.

The Tigers hit on 31 of 52 floor shots for a 60 per cent average and the shorter Quakers made 27 of 69 for 39 per cent.

Bilsky's 18 points paced the Quakers. Wohl collected 15 and Pete Andrews 12.

The new fieldhouse is ready only for basketball, with a main court and four other courts at the ends of the main court.

The two-story building has an area of 250,000 square feet and cost \$6.5-million.

It has an 8-laps-to-the-mile Tartan track, and pole-vault, long-jump and high-jump locations; 13 squash racquets courts, a wrestling room, fencing rooms, six tennis courts and a baseball field convertible for lacrosse, football and soccer.
