

# MANHATTAN, PENN WIN AT PALESTRA

Jaspers Top Temple, 80-68  
 —Princeton Bows, 85-62

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PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 13—  
 Two months ago, Princeton, the  
 defending Ivy League basketball  
 ball champion; Pennsylvania and  
 Columbia were expected to  
 wage a fight for this season's  
 Ivy title. Last month, Prince-  
 ton's Jeff Petrie, the league's  
 top scorer, injured his back and  
 was sidelined.

Tonight, Princeton showed  
 that it missed Petrie considera-  
 bly as Penn whipped the Tigers,  
 85-62, before 4,531 persons in  
 the Palestra.

Manhattan's undefeated team,  
 led by a sophomore, Henry Sea-  
 wright, defeated Temple, 80-68,  
 in the opening game of the  
 double-header.

It was the Jaspers' fourth  
 victory of the season and was  
 the second time in three nights  
 that a New York City team beat  
 Temple, which won the Na-  
 tional Invitation Tournament  
 last March. New York Univer-  
 sity edged the Owls, 64-62,  
 Thursday at Madison Square  
 Garden.

### Hummer Put on Spot

Without Petrie, almost the  
 entire Princeton scoring load  
 falls on John Hummer, the 6-  
 foot-7-inch senior center. Know-  
 ing this, Penn patterned a de-  
 fense to crowd Hummer and  
 take chances with the other  
 Tigers shooting from the out-  
 side.

It worked, even though  
 Hummer scored 27 points.  
 Penn, which matched Hummer's  
 height with Bob Morse at 6-8  
 and which had better short  
 men on the rim of the offense,  
 handed Princeton one of its  
 worst Ivy defeats in a long  
 time.

Petrie may return after the  
 first of the year. The Tigers  
 hope so because without this  
 outside shooter to keep the de-  
 fense from tightening around  
 Hummer, the Tigers are in  
 trouble.

Last season, with Chris  
 Thomforde, Petrie and Hum-  
 mer, Princeton was undefeated  
 in the Ivy race.

### Penn Displays Speed

Penn showed better speed  
 and at times confused the  
 Tigers, forcing 14 turnovers,  
 many of which proved costly.

The Quakers, without a sen-  
 ior starter, managed to shoot  
 51 per cent from the floor to  
 only 35 per cent by Princeton.

With Columbia winning easily  
 tonight, Penn and Columbia  
 must be considered the co-fa-  
 vorites for the Ivy crown now,  
 even if Petrie manages to return  
 in January.

Morse, shooting mostly from  
 inside, and Steve Bilsky, hitting  
 from inside and out, managed  
 25 points each for Penn. Dave  
 Wohl, a little junior with a deli-  
 cate fallaway shot, connected  
 for 13 points for the Quakers.

### Jaspers on Target

In the opener, Seawright led  
 an extremely accurate-shooting  
 Manhattan team with 8 field  
 goals in 11 attempts and 25  
 points. Coach John Powers's  
 Jaspers hit 60 per cent of their  
 shots from the floor.

This was too much for Tem-  
 ple's young team. This Owl  
 squad is not the same team  
 that won the N. I. T. Four  
 starters on that squad were  
 graduated.

The 6-3 Seawright put on a  
 show of ball-handling and  
 shooting from both the outside  
 and inside as he wormed his  
 way around and through the  
 famed Temple zone. Occasion-  
 ally, with Temple's zone  
 backed up, Matt Lynett, Man-  
 hattan's best distance shooter,

popped the ball over the Owls  
 from the left corner.

Lynett finished with 16  
 points as Temple became the  
 first member of Philadelphia's  
 Big Five to lose a home game  
 this season. Penn, Temple, La  
 Salle Villanova and St. Joseph's  
 had won a total of 12 games at  
 home before the defeat.

Ron Manning of Manhattan  
 was nearly as accurate as Sea-  
 wright, hitting on 7 of 11 field  
 goal attempts for 15 points.

Manhattan was faster than  
 the Owls and put up a zone de-  
 fense that proved to be better  
 than that of Coach Harry Lit-  
 wack, considered the master of  
 that defensive technique.

In three games against New  
 York teams, Temple has beaten  
 only St. John's—by a point in  
 the season opener.
