

Penn Takes 18th in Row, 97-63; Princeton Defeats Columbia

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 28 (AP)—Corky Calhoun made his first six shots in a 20-point performance as he led Penn to a 97-63 victory over Cornell tonight. It was the 18th straight victory for the newly crowned Ivy League champions.

In the second game of the double-header, Temple defeated St. Joseph's, 63-59 for the championship of the Middle Atlantic Conference. Temple will meet Villanova here next Saturday in the first round of the National Collegiate tournament.

The 6-foot-7-inch Calhoun also keyed various defenses tried by Penn in preparation for its March 7 National Collegiate tournament opener against Niagara.

It was the 25th victory against a single defeat for Penn and wrapped up a 14-game unbeaten Ivy League season.

The 18-game string is the longest current major collegiate winning streak in the country.

PRINCETON, N. J., Feb. 28—Princeton started the season with hopes of a finish higher than third in the Ivy League but at least the third-placed Tigers ended the campaign with some satisfaction—a 61-55 victory over Columbia before 6,700 persons in Jadwin Gym.

Columbia started the season with hopes of a higher finish than second—its eventual spot—and ended it somewhat as expected after losing its title bid to Pennsylvania last night. Although the Lions tried, their defeat in the key game at the Pelestra could only be followed by a natural letdown.

The frustrations of two of the teams favored to battle for the Ivy crown showed toward the end of the game as some harmless blows were struck. Heyward Dotson of Columbia and Al Duffy were in the center of the short disagreement.

The saddest fact of the game was that it marked the end of the college careers of four of the best players in the league's history. They are Jim McMillian and Doston of Columbia, and John Hummer and Jeff Petrie of Princeton.

McMillian Wins Title

McMillian finished with the most impressive statistics of the four, including a Columbia record of 1,758 points, including 27 against Princeton in his finale.

The Brooklyn resident won the Ivy scoring title for the second time with 344 points in 14 games. He won it as a sophomore. Petrie won the scoring title a year ago as the Tigers took the crown.

Dotson will be missed for his all-round play and floor leadership and Hummer for his ability to move as few 6-foot-10-inch athletes can.

There was little artistry to the game as these rivals just wanted one thing—a good finish. Princeton got that as Columbia made more mistakes and Princeton defended well against all except McMillian.

The Lions were stymied for more than seven minutes during the second half when they didn't score a field goal and Princeton moved to a 9-point advantage. Though the Lions regained a 1-point lead, it was a sloppy struggle that Princeton won at the foul line.

So Columbia concluded the the best three-season span in its basketball history with a 20-5 won-lost record and 11-3 in the Ivy League. Princeton was 15-9 over all and 9-5 in the league.

Yale Routs Harvard, 112-88

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Feb. 28—Jim Morgan sparked Yale to its biggest offensive show of the season with 34 points tonight as the Elis overwhelmed Harvard, 112-88.

Morgan's outstanding performance gave him more than 1,000 points in a two-season college career. Yale jumped to a 16-3 lead and led at half-time, 63-45.

The victory gave Yale a 7-7 Ivy League won-lost record and 11-13 over all, while Harvard finished last in the league with a 1-13 record and was 7-19 over all.

Dartmouth Downs Brown

HANOVER, N. H., Feb. 28—Dartmouth used a 25-point performance by Paul Erland to defeat Brown, 78-68, tonight and complete its first winning season in a decade.

The Indians closed their season with a 13-12 won-lost record, the best since 1959-60 when they finished 14-9. The victory also gave Dartmouth its best Ivy League record since 1960, 7-7, and put the Indians in fourth place in the Ivy League.

Dartmouth never trailed as Erland led a first-half drive that methodically pushed the Indians to a 40-29 half-time lead.
