

PENN VANQUISHES BROWN TEAM, 17-9

Shead and Mellor Score for
Quakers Before 12,400

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 3—

Always a cordial host, Brown won the coin toss in its Ivy League opener against Penn today and elected to kick off rather than receive, defend rather than attack.

It turned out to be like that all day for the Bruins as the Quakers, showing little charity, handed Brown its first defeat of the season, 17-9 before 12,400 fans.

Finding a hero for either side is difficult, because neither team mounted much of a passing attack. The leading rusher turned out to be Gerry Hart, a Bruin running back, who picked up 84 yards in 15 carries.

Pancho Micir, Penn's Quarterback completed six out of 10 passes, one for a touchdown. Bob Flanders, a scrambling senior from North Massapequa, L. I., completed 7 of 20 passes for 95 yards for the Bruins.

Brown got the ball back after the kickoff on the first series of plays. Jim Rianoshek, a defensive halfback, intercepted a pass by Micir on the Penn 44. But four plays later the Bruins gave the ball back to the visitors on downs.

Penn capitalized on that gift by driving 65 yards in 12 plays and scoring. A 15-yard pass from Micir to Chris Shead in the end zone was the scoring play.

After that the Quakers were never caught although Brown managed to stay within striking distance.

Flanders Scores for Bruins

Brown's only touchdown drive started at the end of the first period. It ended 11 plays and 65 yards afterwards. Flanders, going to his left, ran seven yards for the score with one minute 35 seconds gone in the second period.

The attempt for a conversion by Jim Colby was blocked by Jamie Greene, a linebacker. The only other score the Bruins got was a field goal by Tyler Chase in the last quarter.

With Penn leading, 7-6, Berry kicked a 29-yard field goal in the second period to give the Quakers a 10-6 advantage.

The Quakers were forced to punt in the third period but Bob Kaupp, a tackle, recovered a Brown fumble on the Bruins 18-yard line. Penn ran it in eight plays for their final touchdown with 12:40 gone Rich Mellor scored from a yard out.

They drove 62 yards to the Penn 8 on 13 plays only to give the ball up on downs. But Penn lost the ball on the next play as Ron Dawson fumbled and Ken Cieplik recovered for Brown on the 9-yard line.

Brown, however, still the cordial host returned the ball to Penn four plays later, failing to make their yardage, with less than a minute remaining, Micir ran the clock out.
