# TIGERS TURN BACK PENN TEAM, 22-16

## Quakers Fail on Pass From Princeton 5 on Last Play of Close Ivv Battle

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 24-Before today, the Princeton football team never had played a game on artificial turf. The Tigers had heard about it, however, and one of the things they had heard was that the ball takes a true bounce.

But after their first experience today, they don't believe it. To be sure, they survived all the funny bounces, even taking advantage of some, but it took a clutch defensive play by Jeff Davis with no time left to insure a 22-16 victory over Penn. Getting a chance for one last

play because of a pass-interference call against Princeton at the Tiger 5-yard line, Penn tried to pull the game out with a pass from Pancho Micir to Pete Luciano. But Davis, the Tiger safetyman, lunged for the ball and batted it away. There were plenty of other

thrills for the crowd of 36,478 on this pleasant, sunny afternoon, including the following: Two fumble recoveries

Bruce Berger, Penn's defensive end playing his first game of the season, and interceptions in the final two minutes by Princeton's Pete Boyle and Barry Richardson; a touch-down-saving tackle in the first quarter by Penn's Steve Kenoyer, who later recovered an onside kickoff in the fourth, and an 18-yard run on a fake punt by the Tigers' Hank Bjorklund, who finished the day with 145 yards rushing on 27 carries.

But throughout the afternoon, on Franklin Field's As-

troturf, the football kept bouncing the wrong way.
