

Penn Triumphs, 103-72;

Harvard Is 21st Victim

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 19—Harvard displayed better looking hairdos, but Penn had far superior basketball ability tonight and that's why the Quakers gained their 21st victory in 21 games this season.

The Quakers, sparked by Corky Calhoun's 28 points and 15 rebounds, coasted in beating Harvard, 103-72, in the first game of a doubleheader at the Palestra and strengthened their ranking as the nation's No. 4 team.

In the second game, La Salle, playing without its injured star, Ken Durrett, edged Creighton, 64-61. Bob Fields snapped a 56-56 tie with two free throws, then added a field goal seconds later, helping insure the triumph.

Harvard, with many of the players wearing long, bushy hair, long sideburns and well-cultivated mustaches, was trying for its eighth straight victory, but it was actually in contention for only the first nine minutes.

20-2 Spurt for Penn

At that point, the Quakers led by only 18-17. From there, however, Penn outscored Harvard, 20-2, the Crimson's points coming on two free throws.

Overall, the Crimson played for nine minutes and 20 seconds without scoring a field goal. By the time Harvard put in another 2-pointer, it was well on the way to its ninth loss against 12 victories.

"We knew exactly what they were going to do; we prepared for it all week. We just couldn't stop it," said a dejected Harvard coach, Bob Harrison. "They have a pride that's worth a million bucks. They have confidence in themselves, they believe in their coach and they work hard. They deserve to be champions."

K. C. Jones Impressed

There seems to be little doubt that the Quakers will be the Ivy League champions and as such will seek the national championship against such powers as University of California in Los Angeles and Marquette.

"I'd put them on the same level as those teams," commented K. C. Jones, a former pro star who is now a Harvard assistant. "Penn doesn't have the dominating big man in the pivot like those teams, but that's the only difference."

Penn didn't need a big man against Harvard. With Calhoun reaching his career high in scoring and Dave Wohl (12) and Steve Bilsky (7), the backcourtmen, combining for 19 assists, the Quakers continuously bewildered the Crimson.
