

# Penn Remains Unbeaten in 22 Games With 102-75 Victory Over Dartmouth

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### BALANCED ATTACK FORGES TRIUMPH

Morse Notches 22 as Penn Exceeds 100-Point Mark for 2d Game in Row

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PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 20—As Penn's hustling Quakers reached the 100-point mark for the second consecutive game tonight, the first time that's happened in the school's 70-year basketball history, their zealous fans burst out with a familiar chant.

"We're No. 1, We're No. 1, We're No. 1," they screamed. Whether Penn climbs above its No. 4 status in next week's polls remains to be seen, but this much the fans know for sure:

In crushing Dartmouth, 102-75, tonight in its typically methodical fashion, Penn gained its 22d victory and remained one of the two unbeaten major colleges in the country.

Unlike their fans, the Quakers are not immediately concerned with soaring to the No. 1 spot, at least not in the polls.

#### Fitness Is Goal Now

"Our goal right now is to be in the best possible shape for the [National Collegiate] tournament," said Steve Bilsky, a senior from Roslyn, L. I., who has been instrumental in Penn's winning streak that has mushroomed to 40 regular-season games.

"But the big thing is to be in good shape for the tournament. Last year we weren't [they lost in the first game]. Every game was tough and we didn't win the Ivy title until the last weekend. There was more mental pressure last year."

The only real pressure this season is to stay "up" for games against such weaker opponents as Dartmouth, which has a 7-14 won-lost record and is sixth in the Ivy League.

The Quakers weren't nearly as sharp against the Indians as they were the previous night against second-place Harvard, but that didn't come close to affecting the outcome.

#### Team Stresses Defense

"We certainly knew we wouldn't be up tonight, but we were ready to play defense," said Dick Harter, the Penn coach. "I'll say this: the boys seemed to be more conscious of playing two good games in a row than at any time in the past year and a half."

Bob Morse, a 6-foot-8-inch junior, led the Quakers' well-balanced attack, scoring 22 points and grabbing 10 rebounds. Eight of his points came during a spurt in which the Quakers started pulling away midway through the first half. Dave Wohl added 20 points for Penn.

Now only four games remain before the Quakers reach post-season championship play.

"Last year," said Bilsky, "I think there was some doubt in our minds about how good we were. It was the first time we reached national prominence. But this year we've beaten some real good teams and we're quietly confident we can beat anyone."

In the second game of the double-header at the Palestra, Villanova out fought St. Joseph's, 63-55, in a Big Five game that was more bitterly contested in the stands than on the floor.

Villanova went ahead, 49-48, on Howie Porter's jump shot with 6:13 to play, then added 5 points quickly on Clarence Smith's field goal and a 3-point play by Chris Ford.
