

Harvard Tops Penn, 28-27, as Quakers' Late Conversion Try Fails

2-POINT ATTEMPT, A PASS, MISFIRES

Crimson Rushers Offset
Penn Aerials—Clune of

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 30— Pennsylvania scored on 73 and 76 yard pass plays, but failed on a short one for a 2-point conversion and the Quakers lost an Ivy League thriller to Harvard, 28-27, today.

In a continuous passing bombardment, Don Clune, a big sophomore Penn split end, set a new league record for yardage on pass receptions as he caught eight for 284 yards. He also equaled the league mark for a single-game performance by catching three touchdown tosses.

The old record for reception yardage was set by Bill Wazevich of Columbia in 1967 against Princeton when he totaled 214, while Mike Cavalon of Yale in 1957 and Pete Hauck of Princeton last year also scored three times on passes.

With three minutes left, the homecoming crowd of 21,770 was in an uproar at Franklin Field as Clune, a track man and hurdler, caught a pass approximately on the Harvard 40 and raced down for the late touchdown. But Gary Shue's subsequent toss for a victory and 2 points misfired.

Shue connected on 12 of 25 attempts for 352 yards as the overhead game proved Penn's dangerous weapon. The Quakers went ahead quickly in the first period, 14-0, but Harvard, in registering its second league triumph, had a powerful ground game.

202 Yards Rushing

On offense, the Crimson backs gained 202 yards rushing while Jim Stoeckel, their sophomore quarterback, who set a passing record against Dartmouth last week, hit on 12 of 28 for 168 yards. Harvard increased its 21-14 half-time lead with a third-period drive that covered 88 yards in 10 plays with Stoeckel's versatility predominating as he ran, passed and kicked.

He had his team's offense moving smoothly, but Shue's passes continued to prove dangerous. He hit Clune for the opening 73-yard touchdown and it was a 58-yard toss to Clune that paved the way for Penn's third touchdown. Glen Gaetano took the 11-yard aerial this time that completed the touchdown drive. Harvard still led, 28-21. Then, in the fourth period, with Steve Solow contributing runbacks on 40 and 42 yards, the Quakers went to the Harvard 14 before relinquishing on downs. But, with five minutes to go, Shue began hitting receivers again and, although he was thrown for a 7-yard loss to the Penn 24, Penn traveled 95 yards in its drive to its last score.

The score came as Clune, from Haverton, Pa., raced 76 yards to the tally. Penn had two touchdowns and 14 points in the first seven minutes due chiefly to Shue's long tosses. After Penn received the kickoff, Shue's first pass was grabbed by the 6-foot-4, 200 pound Clune, who raced on to complete the 73-yard touchdown play.

It was the longest touchdown pass for Pennsylvania since 1969 when the Red and Blue registered a 74-yard pass play against Bucknell.

Penn Punt Backfires

Before the first quarter was over, Penn's Mike Brumback was set to kick on fourth-down deep in his own territory. He fumbled a low pass from center and it was downed on Penn's 4-yard line. Stoeckel then took the ball over on first down for the opening Harvard touchdown.

Bruce Tetirick's kick was good and the visitors trailed, 14-7. Stoeckel scored two touchdowns and he rushed for 38 yards and completed 6 of 11 tosses for 65 yards in the first half.

Harvard, led by Ted Demars and Stoeckel's dashes, netted 14 points in the second period. The Crimson went 69 yards in eight plays as Stoeckel's pitch-out spread the Penn defense for the score.

In the second period, Gatto scored from the 4 and, later, a fumble by Shue preceded a Harvard drive that covered 48 yards in 11 plays, culminated by Demars going over from the 1. Tetirick converted after each of the touchdowns for the 21-14 half-time advantage.
