
Penn Routs Manhattan; Oral Roberts Triumphs

Penn Routs Manhattan; Oral Roberts Triumphs

Jaspers Beaten, 87-66—Hofstra Bows, 83-74

Penn has a new coach and three new faces were in its starting line-up last night, but the Quakers' basketball program has lost none of its strength.

In overwhelming Manhattan College, 87-66, in the second game of a college basketball double-header at Madison Square Garden, the Quakers were bigger, stronger and deeper than last season's team that lost once in 30 games.

In the first game, Oral Roberts University of Tulsa, Okla., playing its first season of major competition, rallied to beat Hofstra, 83-74, for its fourth straight triumph.

The crowd of 7,286 was larger than those for most of the regular college double-headers at the Garden, and some of the increase could be attributed to the followers of Oral Roberts, the former faith healer for whom the college is named. Roberts had sent letters to almost 60,000 of his followers asking them to attend the game.

'Victory for God'

Outside the dressing room, Roberts told some of his followers, "This was a victory for God, not for basketball." He later met with about 750 of them in the rotunda of the Garden and thanked them for attending the game.

Penn didn't need any help in handing Manhattan its second straight loss. Jack Powers, the Jasper coach, tried man-to-man, zone and one-guard offenses,


zone and one-guard offenses, but none of them worked.

It was the 48th straight regular-season triumph for the Quakers, whose only three losses in their last 61 games have come in tournament play.

come in tournament play.

Chuck Daly, the new Penn coach, has blended Bob Morse and Corky Calhoun, his two returning starters, with Phil Hankinson, Craig Littlepage and Al Cotler, all of whom were reserves last season, and they were overpowering. They shot 52.1 per cent and outrebounded the Jaspers, 47-31.

Morse, 6-8, hit for a career high of 33 points on 14 for 21 from the floor and grabbed 15 rebounds. He scored 21 of his

points in the first half when Penn enjoyed a 47-31 lead.

Richie Garner, who scored 34 points in Manhattan's opener, collected 22 points, making nine of his 16 shots. The Jaspers got little scoring help from anyone else as the team shot 33.8 percent

Hofstra Outscored, 27-8

His Titans did just that in handing Hofstra its third loss in four games. With no set patterns to its game, Oral Roberts took 81 shots, 22 more than Hofstra and shot 348 per cent.

But the Titans saved their scoring strength for the final 9½ minutes, combined it with

a good pressing defense, and outscored the Dutchmen, 27-8.

Richie Fuqua, the 6-foot3inch Oral Roberts backcourt man who averaged 31.4 points last season, took 23 of the shots, made nine and led the scorers with 29 points, his average this season.

Fuqua, who had 15 points on 5 for 12 in the first half, scored 12 of his points after his team started its comeback from a 66-56 deficit.

Although not much taller than Hofstra, the Oral Roberts team controlled the boards in the second half. The Titans had a first-half rebounding edge of 17-14 and were 55-29 for the game.

Fouls Aplenty

The Oral Roberts team was undisciplined during the first half. Besides taking wild shots, it committed 18 of its 26 fouls. Fuqua and Sam McCamey had four each. And Milt Vaughn, who didn't play in the first half, picked up four fouls in five minutes of the second half.

Hofstra played a deliberate offense in the first half, working the ball into Dave Bell, its 6-8 center, and led, 33-20, with 6½ minutes to play. The lead deviated to 46.41 at half-time

There were 51 fouls in the game, 26 of them by Oral Roberts. The Titans' press also forced Hofstra into 23 turn-overs, five in a row in the closing minutes when Oral Roberts made its comeback.
