

PRINCETON SNAPS PENN STRING, 69-56

**Tigers, on Disciplined Play,
Inflict First Ivy Defeat
on Quakers in 31 Games**

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PRINCETON, N. J., Jan. 11—Princeton's young, disciplined basketball team waged a tight defense and controlled a deliberate offense perfectly to upset Pennsylvania, 69-56, tonight, snapping the Quakers' Ivy League record winning streak at 30 games.

Penn won the Ivy title each of the last two seasons by taking all its league games during those campaigns. The Quakers had not lost to an Ivy opponent since Columbia beat them March 1, 1969.

Princeton took sole possession of the league lead before 7,550 fans, who filled Jadwin gymnasium. Penn and Princeton had been tied for the top and were the only undefeated teams in Ivy play before tonight with 2-0 league records.

Taylor Gets 17 Points

Penn suffered only its second defeat in its last 55 regular-season games—both this season.

There were no spectacular shooting performances by the Tigers. Instead it was even team play as Brian Taylor of the Tigers, averaging 25.8 points, made 17 and four others did the rest of the Princeton scoring with 10 or more points each.

While Penn's leading scorer, Bob Morse, did better than his 21-point average with 25, Princeton kept Corky Calhoun to only 2 points on a field goal. Taylor, the junior and driving force of the Princeton team, was assigned to defend against Calhoun, one of Penn's best.

Although Taylor did an excellent job against the man who is 4 inches taller, the remainder of the Princetonians worked out the Calhoun problem quite well by permitting him little chance to get the ball.

Forced to Shoot Outside

This man-to-man defense scrambled up the pattern of Penn's one-guard style of offense, and the Quakers, though taller, were forced to do most of their shooting from a distance.

Offensively Princeton took its time without a slow approach. The Tigers waited patiently for the good shot and hit from outside much better than the Quakers did, making 25 of 42 to 20 of 53 for Penn.

Taylor hit on a jump shot from the left corner after 3½ minutes of play to give Princeton its first lead at 7-5. It was also the Tigers' last time to take the lead as Penn never managed even a tie from that point on.

The score went to 13-5 before Penn got its next point because of a four-minute scoreless stretch for the Quakers.

Coach Pete Carril's Tigers followed his orders perfectly in the late stages of the first half when, leading by 8, they held without too much trouble for most of the last four minutes

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and took a 6-point lead into the dressing room.

Then, when Princeton out-scored Penn, 11-1, midway in the second half, the Tigers clinched the victory by moving from a 45-41 lead to a 56-42 margin with eight minutes to go.

Penn will have a chance to get back at the Tigers when the teams meet Jan. 29 in the Quakers' backyard, the Philadelphia Palestra.
