

Shue Aids 15-10 Victory

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PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 28 — Gary Shue, a senior quarterback from Pennsauken, N.J., came off the Pennsylvania bench in the third quarter today to lead the Quakers to two touchdowns in a come-from-behind 15-10 victory over Princeton before a rain-soaked crowd of 9,285 at Franklin Field.

Shue combined with Adolph Bellizeare, a running back, for the first Quaker score, handing off to him for a 1-yard plunge that capped a 56-yard third-quarter drive. Then Shue found Bellizeare in the end zone with a 2-point conversion pass to put the Quakers within a field goal, 10-8.

Shue, who started the last four games of last season but had been relegated to a third-string status this season, hit Thomas Corbin, a senior tight end, with a 13-yard scoring pass in the final period to put the victory away.

The touchdown pass that Corbin caught was his first at Penn. He also caught his first varsity pass, an 11-yarder, on

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the first successful play of the winning drive.

The highlight of the last scoring drive, which covered 48 yards in six plays, was a play on which Shue lateraled to John Downey, his split end, who then passed downfield to Fred McCormick for a 35-yard gain.

The victory was Penn's third of the season in five games but its first in three Ivy League games.

Princeton, which has won one, lost three and tied one over all, has an 0-2-1 Ivy League mark.

Both teams found the rain-soaked AstroTurf treacherous underfoot and the ball slippery, and there were nine fumbles before half-time and 14 fumbles in the game, nine by the Quakers.

Princeton managed to lead by 3-0 at half-time on a 42-yard field goal by John Bartges in the second period. The Tigers increased their margin to 10-0 in the third period with a 46-yard drive in nine plays, capped by a 13-yard run by Romerio Perkins.

Shue did not come in until Penn's last series of the third period and promptly fumbled his first snap. He stayed to complete 5 of 8 passes for 55 yards and rally the Quakers.

Tom Pinto, the second-string quarterback, who started in place of the injured Marc Mandel, completed 4 of 12 passes for 116 yards but had two interceptions.

Rick Mellor, flanker for the Quakers, was the leading receiver in the game with only two catches but for 106 yards. Bellizeare's 67 yards in 19 carries led all rushers.

Fred Dalzell, Princeton's quarterback, completed 5 of 18 passes for 62 yards. Perkins, with 48 yards in 14 carries, wound up as the Tigers' leading rusher.
