

PENN GIVES YALE 48-30 TROUNCING

Quakers Take 4th Straight
—Elis Lose Ivy Lead

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 11—The University of Pennsylvania's football team took advantage of several Yale mistakes today and scored a stunning 48-30 victory in Franklin Field that knocked the Elis out of first place in the Ivy League and into a tie with the Quakers and Cornell for second place.

The victory was Penn's fourth straight, its fifth against two defeats and its third against two defeats in the league. It also marked the first time since 1941 that Penn had defeated the Ivy League big three—Harvard, Princeton and Yale—in the same season.

Led by Marc Mandel, their third starting quarterback in three weeks, the Quakers rolled up a 41-0 lead before Yale scored and held a 41-8 lead going into the final period, when most of the Penn substitutes were in the game.

Mandel, a 5-foot-11-inch junior from Hartsdale, N. Y., completed seven of 10 passes for 103 yards and one touchdown and Penn's Adolph Bellizeare led all rushers with 66 yards on 17 carries, scoring two touchdowns on 2-yard runs.

The Bulldogs' wishbone offense was in trouble from the outset.

On their first series, they fumbled the ball twice and luckily recovered, but it cost them a total of 9 yards and forced them to punt from their 17-yard line.

Mandel directed a 41-yard drive after that, connecting with Don Clune on a 19-yard pass play for the first Quaker score at 4:20. The conversion kick by Tim Martin failed, and the Quakers took a 6-0 lead into the second period.

They added three touchdowns in the second period: on a 30-yard reverse play by Fred McCormick following an illegal-procedure penalty against Yale that canceled Penn's need to punt, and on Bellizeare's 2-yard plunges.

Bellizeare's first score capped a drive that started on the Yale 26 as the result of a poor punt by the Elis and a 25-yard return by Ken Bald. The second ended a 52-yard drive.

A 50-yard punt return by Bellizeare in the third period set up another touchdown, this one scored by Mandel from the 1-yard line. Then a 52-yard drive that grew out of another poor punt and another Eli penalty culminated in McCormick going over from the 3 at 10:34 of the third period and raising the score to 41-0.

After that the Elis finally got a break, when Gary Shue's pitchout was fumbled by Steve Thorne and recovered by Carl Lewis of Yale on Penn's 34.

Dick Jauron then ran for 28 yards before going across from the 3 for Yale's first score, at 12:56 of the third period.

The count went to 48-8 after John Sheffield got the final Penn touchdown at 1:38 of the last period on a 1-yard plunge.
