

# Penn Tops Dartmouth, 22-16; Brown Defeats Yale

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HANOVER, N.H., Oct. 13—Dartmouth took a step backward today in its drive for a fifth straight Ivy League football championship by dropping a 22-16 contest to Pennsylvania before 17,800 fans at Memorial Field.

Penn captured its second Ivy game, while the Big Green was losing its third game of the season and its first in the league. The Quakers' victory was their first here since 1947 when they beat Dartmouth, 32-0.

Though the Green started with a burst—their first play was a 46-yard scoring pass from Tom Snickenberger to Tom Fleming—they could not sustain a drive, never making more than one first down in any series.

Penn was able to mount several drives, yet still found itself on the end of a 13-0 score in the first quarter as Dartmouth's Don Smith intercepted two passes (one for 47 yards) and John Souba took a pitchout round left end for 33 yards and Dartmouth's second touchdown.

The age-old cliché was working: statistics don't win football games, scoring does. While Dartmouth was coming up with the big plays, Penn was mounting rushing figures of 226 yards to Dartmouth's 110, 137 passing yards to 90, and 23 first downs to just 6 for the Green.

But behind the talented running of Adolph Bellizeare, who gained 120 yards in 34 carries, and the brute force of Johnny Sheffield (41 for 11), Penn started on the way back. Bellizeare put Penn on the scoreboard in the second quarter when he leaped over

the goal on fourth down and a foot to go to make it 13-7.

A 30-yard field goal, however, by Ted Perry of Dartmouth put it back to 16-7, but that was the Green's last gasp as it turned out. The only offensive strength they appeared to have left were Fleming's punt returns. The split end, who specializes in handling kicks, ran one 75 yards to lead up to Perry's three-pointer.

Though the Dartmouth defensive line excelled today, it lost the war by attrition; it was out on the field too long. Stopping a Penn drive at the opening of the third quarter, it yielded on the next series when Martin Vaughn tossed a 10-yard pass to Bob Bucola. The kick failed, but Penn was just 3 points behind and coming on strong.

## Quakers Lead for Good

As the fourth quarter started, the Quakers took the lead for good. A fine punt return by Ken Bald put the ball on the Green 30. In four plays, culminated by a 7-yard pass from Vaughn to Bellizeare in the end zone, Penn went ahead, 20-16.

Dartmouth, though it started imaginatively, left the rest of its surprises in the dressing-room. Running off-tackle dive plays, poorly executed pitchouts and unable to complete a crucial pass, it handed the ball back to Penn until time ran out.

Sending in their sophomore quarterback, Mike Breit, to unleash a desperation passing attack, Dartmouth gave up 2 more points when Breit was tackled in the end zone by Darryl Taylor.

Penn's fortunes appeared

to turn for the better when it replaced its first quarterback, Marc Mandel, for Vaughn at the end of the first quarter. Mandel, a senior, moved the team better through the air, but his passes were being intercepted too, which prompted the coach, Harry Gamble, to bring in Vaughn, a junior.

The line opened bigger holes, which Sheffield and Bellizeare made good use of. Suddenly, the old cliché was wrong: statistics did win for Penn.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 13 (AP)—Dennis Coleman and Pete Beatrice, quarterbacks, each ran for one touchdown and threw for another and Jose Violante contributed two field goals as Brown posted a 34-25 victory over Yale, in an Ivy League game today.

It was Brown's first victory over Yale in 10 years.

Coleman ran the Brown team the first two quarters, lifting the Bruins from a 17-0 deficit to a halftime tie score. Beatrice took over for the final two periods.

Tom Doyle, Yale quarter-

back, threw a six-yard pass to Don Gallagher who ran it in from the 6, and John Donahue plunged for a touchdown from the 1-yard line in the first quarter. Fifteen seconds into the second quarter, Brian Clarke booted a field goal from the 10-yard line for Yale.

Coleman hit Pete Chelovich for a touchdown and ran another in from the 11, and Violante kicked a 32-yard field goal in the second quarter.

Beatrice slipped inside right end for a 9-yard touchdown run to break the half-time 17-17 tie in the third quarter, and Violante booted a 26-yard field goal less than two minutes into the final period.

Beatrice connected with Chelovich on a 10-yard pass for Brown's final touchdown.

Yale's final score came on a pitchout from Kenny Rogan, a substitute quarterback to Rudy Green and a 2-yard run. Rogan passed to Bob Fernandez for a 2-point conversion.
