

Yale Wins As a Pass Fools Penn

NEW HAVEN, Nov. 10—Yale scored last on a trick play, a pass from a halfback to a quarterback, and defeated Pennsylvania today, 24-21, thus knocking Penn out of a tie for first place in the Ivy League, which Harvard and Dartmouth continued to share.

If the third quarter had been left out, Yale would have won in a rout. The Elis were in full control and led at half-time, 10-0, but the Red and Blue fortunes went up as the temperatures went down after the half.

Penn scored three touchdowns to lead, 21-10, but Yale came back in the final period with two touchdowns that may have cost Penn the Ivy title.

The winning touchdown was scored on a pass from Don Gesicki, the sophomore wingback, to Tom Doyle, the quarterback, on fourth down from the Penn 5-yard line. It caught the Penn defense by surprise, and no one covered Doyle, swinging to the outside after he had headed off to Gesicki.

Yale fans with good memories remembered the play from five years ago, when Calvin Hill and Brian Dowling used it with much success. Hill plays here tomorrow with the Dallas Cowboys. The play is illegal in pro football because the quarterback is ineligible to catch a pass.

The game changed its all-Blue complexion early in the third quarter when Marty Vaughan, the Penn quarterback, connected on a 68-yard touchdown pass play to Adolph (Beep Beep) Bellizeare, who had run all over Yale a year ago at Franklin Field.

It was a tremendous play. Vaughan had time, for a change, to get his pass off and he dropped the ball right into the streaking Bellizeare's hands as Beep Beep ran past the Penn substitutes on the sideline.

Rudy Green, Yale halfback, fumbled on the next play from scrimmage and Penn had the ball back on the Yale 32. This was the second of three fumbles lost by Green.

No one covered Bellizeare

on a sweep to the Yale 12 and then he dived from the 2 for the touchdown that gave Penn the lead.

Penn drove 48 yards for its third score, made on a pass from Vaughan to Bob Bucola, the flanker, from the Yale 25.

Carmen Cozza, the Yale coach, went to his bench to get a lift for his team. Rod Gordon returned the kickoff to midfield for a spark and

the sophomore stayed in at fullback as Kevin Rogan replaced Doyle at quarterback. The Eli offense moved.
