

Columbia Routed, 42-8

With Marty Vaughn leading the attack with an explosive aerial display, Pennsylvania kept its slim hopes alive for a first-place tie in the Ivy League race yesterday by crushing Columbia's eleven, 42-8, at Baker Field.

The Penn quarterback produced four touchdown passes in guiding the Quakers to

their one-sided success. Four of the payoff tosses, sandwiched between two running touchdowns, were the plays that gave the game its one-sided nature.

Columbia's rooters in the crowd of 5,330, who braved the wintry winds gusting from the neighboring Harlem River, received little cause for cheer. With less than two

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minutes to play in the first half, the visitors enjoyed a 28-to-0 lead.

It was then that the Lions emitted their loudest roar. Assisted by a 25-yard advance on a pass interference call, Columbia moved to its only touchdown. Doug Jackson, the hard-hitting sophomore, plunged one yard on the play immediately following the penalty and the Lions were on the scoreboard.

Thereafter, Penn's defenses held tight with the result that the Light Blue and White was subjected to its second worst setback of the season, one only topped by the 57-0 licking handed it by Harvard five weeks ago. The defeat was the fifth in a row for the Lions who have triumphed only once this season.

In posting their first Ivy League triumph that followed consecutive reversals suffered at the hands of Harvard and Yale, Pennsylvania created a new Ivy League total offense record of 627 yards. The mark could well have been much higher had not Coach Harry Gamble made such liberal use of reserves in the final period.

While Vaughn was pitching for his quartet of touchdowns to establish a Penn record in that department with a season's output of 14, Don Clune, the outstanding end, was creating an Ivy League mark for career receptions. He latched on to seven yesterday to increase his total to 94. The previous mark of 87 was held by Brown's John Parry, who set it a decade ago.

Despite some sparkling runbacks of kickoffs by Jackson—he ran for 200 yards in six such sorties—as well as his impressive power thrusts, Columbia was in contention only in the opening minutes.

Gaining possession on the game's second play as a result of a Penn fumble, the Lions moved the ball only 2 yards in three tries. At this point, Rudy Gisolfi was called upon to try a 32-yard field goal. His boot, however, was short.

Having missed this opportunity to move into the lead, the Lions spent most of the rest of the afternoon in retreat. Shortly after the game's six-minute mark, Jack Wixted, the Quakers' sophomore halfback from Cherry Hill, N. J., broke away on an explosive 53-yard run through the middle and the visitors were on their way.

Wixted's thrust was in

keeping with Penn's touchdown drives that followed. Tally No. 2 was produced with Clune hitting the end zone on a 17-yard aerial from Vaughn at 13:20 of the opening period.

Bob Bucola then proceeded to take over the scoring focus. He registered both of Penn's second quarter tallies on superb catches. His first touchdown was made on a 35-yard completion in the end zone midway through the quarter. Six plays later he helped Penn to another 6 pointer.

This one resulted from the game's biggest touchdown play, an aerial maneuver that covered 86 yards. Vaughn's contribution in this sequence was a 51-yard bomb that Bucola snared on the Columbia 35. The Penn flanker back had no difficulty in going the rest of the way.

After permitting Columbia to enjoy its brief moment of success shortly before the half-time respite, Penn resumed its scoring. Clune clicked on a 19-yard reception after 10 minutes of the third quarter as the Quakers moved to a 35-to-8 lead.

It took the Philadelphians only four more minutes to register again. Adolph Bellizaare contributed this score with an 8-yard lunge through the right side. The run capped a 72-yard drive that required only 10 plays. It also ended the visitors' scoring for the day, Gamble resorting to substitutes thereafter in large doses undoubtedly with next season in mind.
