

Brown Beaten, 24-0, On Doyle Passing

NEW HAVEN, Oct. 12 — Four big plays gave Yale its third straight victory today, the Elis defeating Brown, 24-0. The scrappy Bruins deserved a better fate but turnovers and penalties went against them as they lost their second Ivy League game of the season.

Brown stopped the Yale

rushing attack, the heart of the team rated by many the best of the Ivies this season. So the big plays made the difference. One was a pretty 30-yard touchdown pass, Tom Doyle to Gart Fencik. The next was a powerful field goal of 38 yards by Randy Carter, his fourth in four attempts this season

Another pass by Doyle good for 42 yards to Bob Fernandez set up the Eli's

second touchdown, one scored by Tyrell (Hurricane) Hennings from the Brown 1. The last big one was a 35-yard run by Doyle, which led to the final score in the fourth quarter, a period in which Brown widely outplayed the home team. That score came on a 13-yard run by Greg Daniels, a second-team senior halfback who thus accomplished his first touchdown for the old Eli.

Brown, a loser by 14-9 to Penn last week, tried and tried. The Bruins ran 82 offensive plays good for 271 yards without reaching the end zone. They came close twice, to the Yale 7 in the second quarter and to the Yale 4 in the final period.

The first time Chuck Maze fumbled and John Smoot recovered for the Blue. That was one of six Brown fumbles, two of which were lost. The second time the Yale line held as Charlie Palmer, a 265-pound offensive tackle playing middle guard on the goal-line defense, stopped Mike Sokolowski for no gain on fourth down.

Apart from the fumbles Brown was penalized 79 yards and had two passes intercepted. The Bruins used two quarterbacks, Dennis Coleman and Pete Beatrice, but they could complete only 7 of 20 pass attempts. Beatrice, who played such a big role in Brown's 35-24 victory over the Elis last season, completed only 3 of 10 as the Yale defense pressed him.

The Eli defenders were there when it counted, led by Brian Ameche, the senior end and son of Alan Ameche, the onetime Baltimore Colt all-pro fullback.

Cornell and Penn put on an amazing offensive display at Schoellkopf Field today, but in the end the big defensive plays told the tale, as the teams battled to a 28-28 deadlock. The tie leaves both squads with a 2-0-1 won-lost-tied record.

Steve Horrigan, a Cornell middle guard, stopped Penn's Adolph (Beep-Beep) Bellizeare for a loss on a fourth-and-1 play at the Cornell 4-yard line with under two minutes remaining to stymie a late Penn threat and preserve the tie for the Big Red. Penn had taken the ball four plays earlier on an interception by a defensive end, Bill Seibolt, after the Cornell quarterback, Kevin Sigler, was sacked hard by a strong Penn rush.

Penn missed one final opportunity with five seconds remaining, but a 40-yard attempted field goal by Tim Mazzetti fell short and wide.

Otherwise, the offenses stole the show. The Cornell attack accounted for 455 total yards, while Penn racked up 402. The Big Red gained 222 through the air and 233 on the ground, while the Quakers posted 204 and 198 figures.
