

Crimson Wins, 39-0, for Fourth Victory

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 2 — The unexpected is the mark of Ivy League football. While the closeness of the final score was the surprise between Yale and Dartmouth down at New Haven today, the decisiveness of the outcome here between Harvard and Pennsylvania was what no one had forecast. The Crimson routed Penn, which had been un-

beaten, leading by 21 points at half-time and going on to its fourth Ivy victory against no defeats, 39-0.

The results of those two games leave Harvard and Yale on top of the league, tied for first with 4-0 won-lost records three weeks before they are to conclude the season here and presumably settle the championship.

Everything went right for the Crimson and almost nothing was right for the Red and Blue. The game had been rated even before the kick-off, with plenty of offense expected from both sides. But Harvard was the one with the attack, while Penn showed nothing of a positive nature.

Apart from the final score,

the most telling statistic related to Adolph (Beep-Beep) Bellizeare, Penn's noted open-field runner from nearby Dorchester. The field never opened up for Beep-Beep as the Crimson defenders held him to only 19 yards rushing in 10 carries, the longest for 6 yards. His few kick-return opportunities were limited, too, and he fumbled at the end of the only good one in the fourth quarter.

Harvard's offense moved for 468 yards, and Milt (the Pineapple) Holt, the left-handed quarterback from Hawaii, was at the heart of most of the gains. Holt ran for 72 yards, scoring once, and he passed for 148 on nine completions in 17 attempts. The best was a 29-yard pass to Pat McNally, the splendid split end who caught the ball between two Penn defenders in the end zone for Harvard's fourth touchdown.

After Harvard made two quick scores in the first quarter, Penn's choice was to pass to catch up. Marty Vaughn, the Red and Blue quarterback, put the ball in the air 29 times and had 15 completions that averaged out only to 16 yards each. He failed to connect on the deep passes that he repeated to the end as the ball either went wild or the Crimson defenders were there.

Penn's closest approach to a score came in the opening period when behind, 14-0. A pass play, Vaughn to Ron Kellogg, covered 48 yards for what might have been a key touchdown. But a holding penalty against the Red and Blue canceled out the score.

Poor tackling also hurt the losers, especially on Harvard's second and last touchdowns. On the former, Mike Page returned a punt 40 yards among many grasping defenders. On the latter, John Flood, a third string fullback, swept 31 yards around end amid flailing Pennsylvanians.

Gone for good were Penn's dim hopes of winning its first Ivy championship since 1959. The Red and Blue has dominated the league in most team sports in recent years, except for football, and this team was highly touted, a tie against Cornell the only negative mark on its record.

Harvard showed a lot, with plenty of speed out of the backfield, which lined up in multiple sets. The most favored was a shift into the double-wing, with one back in motion. Holt kept the ball and ran from this set or handed off to swift Tommy Winn. He was the game's leading ground-gainer with 80 yards in 13 carries. The Crimson amassed 23 first downs, overcoming 73 yards in penalties, and the defense dropped the Penn quarterbacks nine times while attempting to pass.
