Penn Defeats Dartmouth, 27-20, As Vaughn Sparks Late Rally

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 23—Penn capitalized on two fumbles and a pass interference penalty today and defeated Dartmouth, 27-20. The Quakers clinched third place in the Ivy League. Penn rallied for three touchdowns in the second half with a 4-2-1 won-lost-tied mark, Dartmouth finished with 3-4.

The passing of Marty Vaughn for Penn and Tom Snickenberger for Dartmouth featured the closing game for each team. Snickenberger injured a leg in the second quarter and retired temporarily. He returned in the third quarter but was again replaced by Mike Brait. Each of them directed the Big Green to leads of 7-0 and 17-7, the halftime score.

The game did not turn around for Penn until 12 minutes 40 seconds of the third period when Vaughn passed 31 yards to Carl Smith in the end zone. Tim Martin's third successful conversion made the score 21-17.

The 47-yard drive had been set up by the recovery of a Dartmouth fumble by David Petuskey. Earlier Penn had recovered a fumble and driven 22-yards for a touchdown. Adolph Bellizeare scored that one on a 16-yard run.

In the fourth quarter an interference penalty gave

Penn the ball on Dartmouth's 2-yard line. On fourth down Vaughn passed to Bucky Bucala for the final touchdown.

Chris Bjelland of Dartmouth kicked a 36-yard field goal, his second of the game, in the fourth quarter.

Vaughn surpassed Bill Creedan's career offensive record of 3,451 yards with 3,633.

WORCESTER, Mass., Nov. 23 (AP)—Dave Quehl turned two passes from Bob Morton into Holy Cross touchdowns as the Crusaders defeated Connecticut, 23-14, today in a game riddled with mistakes by both teams.

Holy Cross, going into its season finale next week against Boston College, with a 5-4-1 won-lost-tied record, helped Connecticut to its only

touchdown when a punt was called back on an offside penalty. Morton then had to fall on the ball after juggling his second punt attempt. Connecticut took the ball at the 12 and scored in four plays.

The other Holy Cross touchdown, a 2-yard dive by Mark Cannon, capped an 80-yard drive. That drive was kept alive when a third-and-15 pass from Morton to Quehl was incomplete, but Connecticut was penalized 15 yards for unsportsmanlike conduct.

Connecticut, finishing its season with a 4-6 record, had taken an early 6-0 lead on long field goals by Greg Sinay. One came after Jerry Kelley had missed a 44-yard goal attempt for the Crusaders. The second came three minutes later after a fumble by Steve Hunt that was recovered by Connecticut's Paul Scaffidi.
