

Tennessee Freshman Scores 42 in 'Confidence' Game

College basketball coaches often try to schedule a few breathers at the start of the season to give teams what Ray Mears, the Tennessee coach, calls "a chance to get your feet wet and build confidence."

Such was the case in the first weekend of play. But even if the competition

wasn't the toughest in many cases, there were some interesting developments.

¶ Bernard King, five months out of Fort Hamilton High School in Brooklyn, didn't need to build his confidence. He scored 42 points in 28 minutes in his first college game as Tennessee routed the University of Wisconsin at Milwaukee, 85-65.

¶ Ticky Burden, who had his name placed on the National Basketball Association hardship draft list last May but later withdrew it, scored 44 points for Utah, which changed coaches, but not its run-and-shoot game. The Utes routed Denver, 119-94.

¶ Maryland won and lost in defeating Richmond, 106-81. John Lucas, an all-Atlantic Coast Conference guard as a sophomore last season, suffered a cracked collarbone near the end of the first half after scoring 17 points. Further X-rays are scheduled today to determine how long he will be sidelined.

¶ David Thompson's patented "Alley-Oop" layups worked well and the player-of-the year as a junior opened with a 33-point performance in North Carolina State's 98-91 victory over East Carolina.

¶ Pauley Pavilion remains the place the University of California, Los Angeles, reigns supreme. The Bruins ran their home-court winning streak to 67 games with a 79-64 triumph over DePaul.

At Tennessee, King made up for some of the scoring void left by Ernie Grunfeld, the Southeastern Conference freshman of the year, sidelined with a broken right wrist.

"Bernard is one of the quickest inside men I've ever seen," said Mears. "He hit on 18 of 35 shots of 15 feet or less before fouling out. He's one of the finest freshmen in the nation. We're really going to be something when he teams with Grunfeld." King is a 6-foot-5-inch post man.

Coach Norm Sloan used North Carolina State's opener as a seminar for trying new plays and strategy, and for finding a center to replace the graduated Tom Burleson. Sloan rotated Phil Spence, Tim Stoddard and Ken Carr, a freshman, at center. All are forwards. Spence, who stands 6-8, showed best with 22 points, 17 rebounds and seven blocked shots.

Richard Washington and Dave Meyers, the starting forwards who flank Ralph Drollinger, the mountain-climbing center, led U.C.L.A. to its second straight one-sided victory. Washington, a 6-9 sophomore, scored 20 points, and Meyers, a senior and the only starter from last season's team, had 18.

Elsewhere among the nation's top teams, Indiana routed Tennessee Tech, 113-60. The Hoosiers scored the first 12 points and had a 20-point lead after seven

minutes of play. Scott May scored 22 and Steve Green 20 for Indiana.

"They have a lot of talent, and they play well together," said Connie Inman, the losing coach. "Our team wasn't a very good measuring stick."

Kevin Grevey of Kentucky, the S.E.C.'s leading scorer last season, collected 32 points in the Wildcats' 97-70 triumph over Northwestern.

Rich Kelley, Stanford's 7-footer, set a school record of 24 rebounds in the 92-80 victory over Louisiana State. . . . Notre Dame routed Valparaiso, 91-80, with Adrian Dantley, the high-scoring sophomore, collecting 37

points. . . . Penn, the Ivy League champion the last five seasons, won the Clemson Booster Club tournament by defeating Clemson, 76-75. Skip Wise, the Tigers' heralded freshman, scored 38 points and was named the most valuable player.

Kansas, the Big Eight favorite, kept Northeast Missouri State from scoring a field goal for 11 minutes in the second half and won, 65-50. Purdue, Michigan and Minnesota, the teams expected to battle Indiana for the Big Ten title, all won easily. Purdue stopped Indiana State, 98-80; Minnesota crushed North Dakota State,

80-47, and Michigan beat Toledo, 78-64.

Among local teams, Mel Utley, the key to St. John's season, scored 28 points as the Redmen routed Wayne State, 109-65. Fordham may be worse off than expected if the Rams' 70-47 loss to Princeton is an indication. Armond Hill, the Tigers' sophomore guard, scored 21 points. Montclair State tried nationally-ranked Memphis State for an opener and was routed, 96-60. Floyd Lane made a winning debut as coach of City College as the Beavers routed Columbia, 90-79, to spoil Tom Pender's debut as the Lion coach.
