

Crimson Sets Back Penn, 21 to 3

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 1— It took Harvard, the Ivy League leader, just 3 minutes 58 seconds to score its first touchdown today in Franklin Field, and from there the Crimson went on to a 21-3 victory over Pennsylvania.

A homecoming crowd of 17,256 watched as Harvard earned its fourth league

victory in four games while the Quakers fell to a 1-3 mark.

Harvard's task was made considerably easier because of the absence of Jack Wixted, the nation's No. 2 all-purpose runner behind Rocky Bell of Southern California. Wixted was in the college hospital in midweek, suffering from a sore rib cage plus ankle and back injuries.

Harry Gamble, the Penn coach, would not take any chances of further injuries to the star. Without Wixted, Penn's running game was not the threat it might have been.

But Harvard also suffered

a serious loss when its star quarterback, Jim Kubacki, left the game early in the third period with an injury to his left shoulder. He had missed part of last Saturday's game with Dartmouth.

This time Kubacki did not return to action, but by then Harvard had taken control. The Crimson scored at the outset, thanks to a kickoff return of 64 yards by Larry Schember that carried to the Penn 28. Nine plays later Kubacki handed off to Tommy Winn on a 5-yard scoring play. End Lynch booted the first of three conversion points.

Penn's scoring play came as a result of a fumble by Winn at his own 39. Jeff Koury recovered for the Quakers. Bob Graustein passed 19 yards to Bob Kellogg as Penn reached the Harvard 4 on a first down. But Harvard stopped Penn there and Tim Mazzatti kicked a 22-yard field goal.

After Lynch missed a 29-yard field-goal attempt at the start of the second quarter, Harvard turned loose its big-yardage play, a 38-yard pass from Kubacki to Jim Curry that put the Crimson on the Penn 17. Winn split the middle for 8 yards, then Kubacki scrambled the final 9 yards. The march covered 63 yards in four plays.

A Penn fumble, by Mike Daley on Curry's 52-yard punt into the wind, was recovered by Walt Herbert on the Penn 20. Kubacki took his team to the 4, but on second down Penn's fine linebacker, Bob Mardula, intercepted a pass in the end zone, ending the threat.

Harvard came right back after holding Penn and forcing Al McManus to punt to the Crimson 42. Kubacki and Curry collaborated again, this time for 53 yards to the Penn 4. Five plays later — including a 5-yard Harvard penalty — the Crimson was stopped on the 1-yard line when Mardula halted Kubacki's final plunge.

Kubacki Scores for Harvard

Penn went from its 1 then to the Harvard 14 where Mazzetti's 31-yard field goal attempt sailed wide to the left as the half ended.

Kubacki directed an early third-quarter drive that carried Harvard deep into Penn territory, but on the fourth play of the series Kubacki suffered a possible shoulder separation to his throwing arm. X-rays were to be taken in after Harvard returned home.

Lynch took over the signal-calling role as Harvard moved to the 6-yard line but his field goal attempt was wide.

Penn began from its 20 but Graustein fumbled on the very first play and Steve Kasetta recovered for Harvard. On second down Lynch hit Bob McDermott in the end zone 18 yards away to give Harvard a 21-3 lead midway through the third period.
