## Geise, Guman Score In Beating Syracuse

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa., Oct. 16 (AP)—Joe Geise and Mike Guman combined for 187 yards and three touchdowns today as Penn State beat Syracuse, 27-3, in the 54th meeting of the Eastern college football rivals.

Geise, who gained 98 yards, scored from 27 yards out. Guman, a freshman, gained 89. He tallied from the 3 and the 1.

Syracuse's only score came on a 24-

yard field goal in the second quarter by Dave Jacobs.

Geise Scores First

Geise scored the first Penn State

touchdown on his 27-yard run, four plays after Syracuse had fumbled the

ball away early in the first quarter.

Tony Capozzoli, a freshman, made the score 10-0 in the second quarter on a 25-yard field goal, shortly after Syracuse had turned the ball over by fumbling a fourth-down center snap on a punt attempt.

Penn State raised it to 17-3 near

halftime on a 10-play, 76-yard drive capped by Guman's 3-yard dive into the end zone.

Penn State drove 64 yards on 12 plays in the third quarter to make it 24-3, with Guman diving into the end

zone from the 1-yard line. Penn State wrapped up its scoring late in the third period on a 34-yard field goal by Capozzoli.

This was the fourth loss, against two victories, for Syracuse. Penn State evened its record at 3-3.

Pennsylvania 15, Lafayette 14

EASTON, Pa., Oct. 16—A 1-yard plunge by Johnny Mason late in the

fourth quarter gave Pennsylvania a 15-14 victory over Lafayette today.

The Quakers' offense had sputtered throughout the game but their kicker Tim Mazzetti scored three field goals, including one of 54 yards, and kept Penn within striking distance. The vic-

tory was the second in a row for Penn, which had beaten previously undefeated Brown, 7-6, last week.

Penn had scored first in the game when Mazzetti kicked a field goal from 26 yards out with 5 minutes 46 seconds left in the first period.

Penn did not pick up another first down until just before the end of the second period. Lafayette, now 1-4 for

the season, took the lead with 2:38 left

in the first half when John Orrico scored from I yard out.

Penn moved 69 yards in the subsequent drive down to the Lafayette 23 and Mazzetti then kicked his second field goal of the day, this one 40 yards. The half-time score was 7-6, Lafayette.

Lafayette dominated first half statistics with 154 yards' total offense.

Mazzetti put the Quakers in the lead in the third period when he tied his own Penn record with a 54-yard field goal. He had kicked a field goal from that distance earlier in the season in a 24-10 loss to Lehigh.

Lafayette moved back into the lead

midway through the fourth period when Mark Jones, who completed 13 of 23 passes for 203 yards, hit Orrico over the middle and Orrico raced down the field for 86 yards and the touchdown. Dave Heverling added the extra point that put the Leopards in front, 14-9.

Then Penn's Bob Grustein passed to Tim Kelly for 37 yards, then connected with Jim Delehanty for 40 more. The passes gave Penn a first down on the Lafayette 13.

Mason then carried twice, the second

for the winning touchdown with  $3\frac{1}{2}$  minutes left.

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
