

Penn Holds On to Defeat Dartmouth, 7-3

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PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 12—Pennsylvania's football team stopped Dartmouth on the 2-yard line in the fourth quarter to preserve a 7-3 victory this cold, sunny afternoon.

Dartmouth's loss, before 14,184 fans at Franklin Field, was its second straight to an Ivy League team, an unfitting end to Coach Jake Crouthamel's career in Hanover, N.H. Crouthamel announced his retirement before last

week's game against Brown. The Bruins beat Dartmouth then, 13-10, and Penn added the final note of disappointment today as the Ivy League season came to a close.

Neither team was overwhelming, especially in the first half, but Dartmouth did manage a 3-0 lead on Dick Lowery's 22d career field goal, a 23-yard boot.

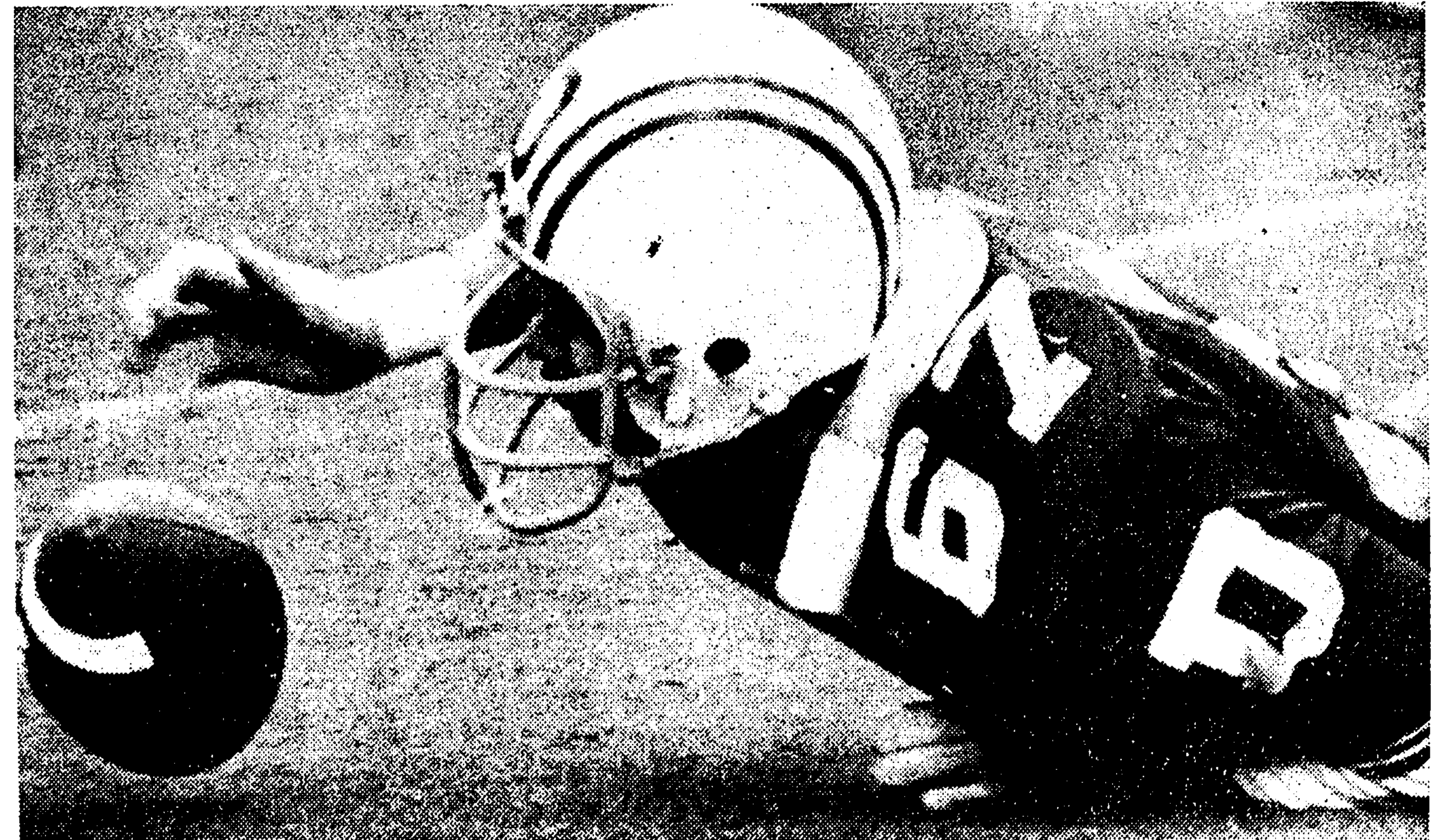
Even this score was something of a gift. Penn's Tom Roland, pitching out to Johnny Mason on Penn's 19-yard line, tossed the ball 5 yards behind

Mason, and Dartmouth's Dave Taylor recovered on the 12.

-Dartmouth's failures became evident then and there. In three plays the Big Green got only to the 6. Then Lowery ended the brief drive with his 3-pointer, at 2 minutes 38 seconds of the opening period.

Matters stayed that way to the intermission, as both teams were hampered by penalties and turnovers that stalled drives. Dartmouth also blocked a field-

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goal attempt by Ross Perilstein early in the second quarter. It was that sort of first half—full of possibilities, with few results.

Penn Helped by Interception

But the Red and Blue finally took advantage of a Dartmouth miscue to take the lead. Bob Dix, Penn's outstanding linebacker, picked off a Steve Ferraris pass on the Dartmouth 42. In 10 plays Penn drove to the 2-yard line, and Mason then blasted over the left side for the touchdown at 6:11 of the third quarter. Perilstein booted the extra point, and the Penn lead was 7-3.

Dartmouth, playing without the injured Curt Oberg, its fine fullback, then drove from its 33 to the Penn 38, but on fourth down the Red and Blue defenders again stalled Dartmouth's drive. Penn's time-consuming wishbone offense ate up the remainder of the quarter.

Early in the final period Dartmouth recovered another errant Roland pitch-out, on the Penn 32. With Sam Coffey, Ferraris and Chris Vasilu carrying the ball, Dartmouth drove to the 2. Buddy Teevens, installed at quarterback then, tried to get the first down on fourth and 1 but failed by inches, and Penn took possession.

Rich Serino, punting into the wind, kept Dartmouth deep in its own territory the remainder of the game. Teevens tried an aerial attack, which had the Penn defenders well spread, but he could not move his team, and Penn again took over with less than a minute to play.

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
