

Tigers Bow in Duel of Coaches

PRINCETON, N.J., Dec. 20 — Butch van Breda Kolff, Pete Carril's coach at Lafayette College 17 years ago, gave his former pupil a lesson in disciplined basketball as the University of New Orleans defeated Princeton, 53-45, in Jadwin Gymnasium. Van Breda Kolff once played for and then coached Princeton, and Carril succeeded him as the Tigers' coach.

Tim Owens, a 5-foot-10-inch sophomore, scored 8 of New Orleans' last 12 points, including six straight free throws in the last two minutes.

Princeton, behind Bob Roma's outside shooting, led midway in the game. Then Mike Edwards tied the score at 36-36 with a jump shot, and put New Orleans into a 2-point lead with 10 minutes 33 seconds left on two free throws. Princeton never got closer.

In van Breda Kolff's tradition, which was passed on to Carril, both teams played a tight man-to-man defense. The first score came after six minutes of play, and after 19 missed field-goal attempts.

"It's the University of New Orleans versus Princeton, not me versus Peter," said van Breda Kolff after the game. Carril took over in 1967, after van Breda Kolff had coached the Tigers for five years.

Princeton was led in scoring by Roma, who had 17 points. Edwards got 20 for New Orleans.

The Tigers' won-lost record is 5-4; New Orleans is 4-3.

St. Francis 94, City 57

Lou Rossini, in his 25th year of coaching, celebrated his 350th victory last night as his St. Francis College team defeated City College, 94-57, at the Physical Education Center in Brooklyn.

In his fourth year at the Brooklyn school, Rossini has a 46-38 record. His 350-247 career mark includes seasons at New York University and Columbia.

After going ahead by 23 points at the half (48-25), the Terriers, now 5-3, held the lead the rest of the way. Nestor Cora led all scorers with 26 points and had five steals, six assists and six rebounds. Manny Figueroa grabbed 19 rebounds and Alex Vega shot 10 for 16 for 21 points.

Dudley Biggs registered 19 points and seven rebounds for the Beavers, now 2-5.

Fairleigh 66, Tenn. Tech 59

RUTHERFORD, N.J., Dec. 20 — Fairleigh Dickinson converted six foul shots in the final 46 seconds tonight to preserve a 66-61 victory over Tennessee Tech.

Glenn Snape hit two foul shots to

make the score 62-59. In the final 15 seconds, Buddy O'Donnell made four free throws to clinch the Knights' fourth triumph against three losses.

O'Donnell, with 6 of 6 from the field, finished with 16 points. Snape and Ken Webb each scored 14.

Jimmy Howell and Pete Abuls got 18 apiece for the losers, who are now 3-5.

Fairleigh, which played without its leading scorer, Dan McLaughlin, made 24 of 48 shots; Tennessee Tech hit on 26 of 49.

C.W. Post 88, Marist 79

GREENVALE, L.I., Dec. 20 — Outscoring Marist, 14-2, at the start of the second half, C. W. Post erased a 10-point halftime deficit and went on to an 88-79 victory in a Big Apple Conference game tonight. Post, which snapped a three-game losing streak, is now 2-5 over all, 1-2 in the conference. Marist is now 5-4 over all, 1-3 in the conference.

C. W. Post overcame the 43-33 intermission deficit by shooting 76 percent (19-25) from the floor in the second half. The catalyst was Don Chapman, a 6-foot guard from Brooklyn. In the first nine minutes of the second half, when C. W. Post outscored Marist, 22-4, Chapman had 7 points, five steals and four assists. He finished with 12 points, five assists and nine steals.

Mike Petrie, a 5-10 sophomore guard from East Hampton, was high scorer for the Pioneers with 19 points. Bob Purslow chipped in with 18.

Temple 73, Manhattan 69

Ricky Reed, the Temple University co-captain, scored the last 5 points including three fouls shots in the final eight seconds as the undefeated Owls outlasted Manhattan College, 73-69, at the Jaspers' Draddy Gymnasium last night.

Manhattan, now 2-7 and without a victory in the last five outings, had a chance to take the lead with 21 seconds remaining, but Jo Jo Walters's baseline attempt was blocked by Ron Wister, Temple's 6-foot-11-inch sophomore center. Wister easily won the ensuing jumpoff against the 6-2 Walters and tapped the ball to Reed to keep Temple's record intact at 7-0.

The Owls' other senior co-captain, Bruce Harrold, scored a career-high 24 points. Walters, who entered the game as the East's second-leading scorer with a 25.6 average, led Manhattan with 20 points. He missed most of the second half after reinjuring a bruised knee with 15:12 remaining and Manhattan leading, 45-40.

Penn 88, Wake Forest 66

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 20 (AP) — Angelo Reynolds, a Pennsylvania freshman seeing his first action of the season, made six of eight shots from the field and scored 12 points as undefeated Penn routed Wake Forest tonight, 88-66, for its fifth victory.

Penn had a 42-32 lead at intermission and then outscored the Deacons, 13-4, at the outset of the second half.
