Penn Gains Share of Ivv Title

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 20 — Angelo Reynolds, a 6-foot-2-inch freshman from this city's West Side, scored his only field goal of the game in overtime tonight to give the University of Pennsylvania a 42-41 victory over Princeton. The triumph assures the Quakers of at least a tie for the Ivy League championship.

The defeat marked the second of the season in overtime for Princeton at the hands of the Quakers. And it was Reynolds who scored the game-winning basket in last month's clash. In the closing seconds of that contest, won by Penn, 59-58, Reynolds connected for a 3point play. Tonight, Reynolds sank his game-winner with 3:11 left.

When Princeton's Neil Christel lost the ball after the Tigers had gained

possession following Reynolds's shot,

Penn went into a ball-control game. "Naturally I had our players go into the deep freeze," said Bob Weinhauer, the Quakers' coach. "There was no sense doing anything that would cause us to lose the ball."

Penn Unbeaten in League

Said Princeton's Coach Pete Carril: "This was a tough one to lose. It wasn't just another game. It was a great one."

For Penn, now unbeaten in all 10 of its Ivy League starts, the game proved a study in patience. Princeton used a stubborn zone defense and repeatedly, with either Tim Olah or Steve Mills as the playmakers, the Tigers kept passing the ball, sometimes for more than a minute, before trying for a shot.

Dave Blatt, a 6-3 performer from Framingham, Mass., gave Princeton a 39-37 lead on a driving layup with 1:08

to play in regulation.

Thirty-four seconds elapsed before Quaker rooters breathed easier. At that point, Matt White connected with a layup that sent the game into overtime.

Penn Couldn't Take Charge

In the extra period, Princeton scored on a layup by Blatt after 59 seconds. Penn's star, Tony Price, narrowed the deficit to a point with a free throw.

Thirty seconds later, Reynolds produced the clincher. It was made on a well-executed, 20-foot baseline shot that struck home without touching the rim.

The favored Quakers were unable to take command against the Princeton zone. They were tied at 22-all at the intermission, but managed to build a 31-23 lead, their biggest of the game, after 8:15 of the second half.

But the Tigers, led by Bob Rome and Randy Melville, ran off a 10-2 spurt to even the score at 35-all.

"They really kept this game tight." said Weinhauer. "But when Princeton plays us, that's what usually happens."
