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Field Goal by Yale Defeats Dartmouth

NEW HAVEN, Oct. 13 — A 24-yard field goal by Dave Schwartz, a former soccer player, was the only score today in the Dartmouth-Yale game won by the unbeaten Elis, 3-0. It was their fourth victory and one achieved with good defense.

The outcome left Yale in a tie with Cornell, its opponent in three weeks, for first place in the Ivy League. Dartmouth, the defending Ivy champion, lost for the third time in four games; its other decision was a tie with New Hampshire.

Yale dominated this game, but could not put the ball in the Green end zone. The contest ended with Yale killing time, and on the last play Dennis Dunn, the quarterback, dropped to his knees on the Green 15-yard line.

Elis Gain 284 Yards

The Elis gained 284 yards to only 84 for Dartmouth, which failed to make a first down in the second half and had only three for the game. Yale ran 84 plays to 49 for Dartmouth, whose punter, Chris Sawch, kicked a dozen times for a respectable 35-yard average.

One punt return by Yale's strong man, Mike Sullivan, proved to be the key play. Sullivan, a weight-lifting fullback, returned a punt by Sawch 35 yards late in the second period to the Dartmouth 12-yard line and four downs later Schwartz kicked the field goal that decided the 63d game between these rivals.

Schwartz had missed on a 28-yard attempt earlier and Dartmouth had one scoring opportunity, an unsuccessful 42-yard field goal early in the third period that came after one of the few turnovers of the game. That one was a pass by John Rogan of Yale that was intercepted by Cody Press, a Dartmouth safety who returned the ball 20 yards to the Eli 22.

This was the third of only three occasions when the Green had the ball on the Yale side of the field. The closest Dartmouth ever got was the Yale 19, but the halfback, Greg Henry, fumbled in the first quarter.

In the second half it was largely three downs and punt for both sides. There were 11 punts in the last two quarters as both teams anticipated a mistake, either a fumble, an interception or a blocked kick, to open up the stalemate. These errors never came.

Dartmouth had Jeff Kemp, son of

Jack Kemp, a Republican Congressman from New York and a former pro player, at quarterback, and Dave Shula, son of Don Shula, the Miami Dolphin coach, at wide receiver. Kemp was in action again after sitting out the Holy Cross game because of an 18-stitch chin wound in the New Hampshire game.

Shula Double Covered

Yale wisely double covered Shula, an all-Ivy receiver last season, and he caught only two passes for 13 yards. Kemp, who completed only five of 17 attempts, went elsewhere, principally to Eric Cutter, the flanker, and if his receivers had held on to some of those passes, the outcome might have been different.

Yale used two quarterbacks, Dunn the runner and Rogan the passer. The senior Dunn started and finished the game and ran the ball 24 times for 46 yards. The sophomore Rogan was wild, completing only two of eight pass attempts, with two being intercepted. Ken Hill, Yale's halfback, was the workhorse. Hill was playing with one of those inflatable flak jackets to protect injured ribs and gained 90 yards and helped Yale to stay on the attack.

"We made mistakes and were lucky to get away with them," said the Yale coach, Carmen Cozza. Yale has not scored a touchdown against Dartmouth since 1976, but the outcome today was better than the last two times, when the Green won, 3-0, and 10-3.

The Elis have now gone nine games without being defeated over two seasons, the last defeat having been to Dartmouth a year ago.

As for the Green it has made only two touchdowns and scored just 17 points in four games. Joe Yukica, its coach, said sagely, "We have to score sometime." The next opponent is Harvard.

Brown 24, Penn 18

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 13 (UPI) — Larry Carbone ran for one touchdown and passed for another today to lead Brown to a 24-18 victory over Penn. Marty Moran went over from the 1-yard line in the final period to give Brown the winning touchdown.

Penn, which had not held a lead on any team all season, opened the scoring in the first period with a 70-yard touchdown pass from Doug Marzonie to Jerry Smith.
